#### AS THE SNOW MELTS AWAY...



In the arid landscapes of California, water scarcity has become a pressing issue, exacerbated by prolonged droughts and increasing demands from a growing population. One innovative solution that has garnered attention is the Cadiz Water Project, as shared by CEO **Susan Kennedy**,

who spoke at the first meeting of 2024. Situated in the Mojave Desert, this ambitious initiative aims to provide a reliable and sustainable water source for Southern California, addressing the region's chronic water shortages.

The Cadiz Water Project centers around the extraction of groundwater from an aquifer beneath the Cadiz Valley. The aquifer, estimated to contain billions of gallons of water, has been a focal point for water management discussions for decades. The project proposes to pump a fraction of this water and transport it through a 43-mile pipeline to the Colorado River Aqueduct, which would then distribute the water to water agencies serving Southern California.



California's snowpack is shrinking with more precipitation falling as rain and atmospheric rivers than snow. Our existing reservoirs and groundwater banks have limited ability to capture these storm waters. Cadiz provides the largest new groundwater bank in Southern California with 1 million acre-feet of underground storage capacity, safe from evaporation. Surplus water can be safely stored at Cadiz and withdrawn when needed, without loss to evaporation or risk of curtailment due to drought



The Cadiz Water Project emphasizes sustainable water management practices. By utilizing only a fraction of the aquifer's recharge rate – the natural replenishment of underground water – the project aims to ensure the long-term viability of the water source.

Proponents of the project argue that it is designed with meticulous consideration for environmental impact. The extraction rate is intended to be well below the aquifer's natural replenishment rate, minimizing adverse effects on the ecosystem and preserving the desert's delicate balance.

The reliable water supply can potentially stimulate economic growth in the region, particularly in areas that have struggled due to water scarcity.

The Cadiz Water Project stands at the intersection of addressing California's water challenges and the need for sustainable water management. As the state grapples with the impacts of climate change and population growth, innovative solutions like the Cadiz Water Project become increasingly important. However, the project's fate hinges on striking a delicate balance between meeting water demands and ensuring the preservation of vital ecosystems in the Mojave Desert. Only through transparent and thorough assessments, collaboration among stakeholders, and adherence to environmental best practices can the Cadiz Water Project hope to provide a viable and sustainable solution to California's water needs.
