January 12, 2021 THE HISTORY OF VICTORVILLE (PART 1)

We began this week with a new series from our own **Terry Caldwell** about the history of Victorville, continuing from a series in 2020 by "The Griz" on the history of Hesperia. Where Terry is Senior Partner at Caldwell, Kennedy & Porter, 8-time Mayor of Victorville (*he's a slow learner*) and 40 years on the City Council, we can now call him the resident Historian of Victorville.

The story of Victorville begins way back in 1902. At the time there was not much in the area, but that year

helped begin to shape the High Desert all the way past Bishop to the Nevada Border. At that time the LA Department of Water & Power got water by any means necessary from Owens Lake. They did this by building canals to export water to Los Angeles.

By 1908 the development of canals in the Sierra Mountains started the Big Creek Hydro-Electro Plant, with the damning of rivers so water would have to run through the Plant which allowed for electricity for communications, as there were no phones back then. During this time there were a crop of electric companies such as Pacific Light & Power, Edison, So Cal Co., and California Electrical Power.

In 1910, the Interstate Telegraph Company was founded and by 1912, they serviced 2 counties in Nevada, Inyo, Eastern Kern and some parts of the California Desert. With the arrival of the telephone system, the company changed its name from "Telegraph" to "Telephone" and serviced all of 388 phones, to those who could afford it. The company was headquartered in Bishop, CA and led by Willard Wade. Once established Willard then chose to move its facility to a little place

called Victorville due to there being no future for the company in Bishop, as the LA Dept of Water & Power owned most of the land, but Willard knew that as long there was water, the Desert region would grow.

In 1962, Victorville incorporated and the main proponent in making that happen was none other than, yep Willard Wade. Willard became the first Mayor of Victorville and helped shape the City of 8,000, which was largest city in the desert at the time.

Finally, in 1966, there was an acquisition of Cal Interstate by Contel, and the company grew even larger from there. Contel handled all telecommunications for the Western States and the Caribbean, all from their headquarters in Victorville! Contel became the 4th largest telecommunications company in the world, and was later bought by GTE and then acquired by Verizon.

That closes the chapter on part one of our history of Victorville. We look forward to hearing from Terry again soon, and more about our great city.

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January 11, 2021 was National Human Trafficking Awareness Day. The Summerlin Rotary Club's Child Sex Trafficking Awareness Campaign Committee will be producing and hosting a special one-hour Zoom Webinar on that day at 6:00 p.m. that will the explore the problem in Southern California and Southern Nevada. The awareness Campaign, NV/CA's Children are Priceless, will launch in the fall of 2021 and we will be a pilot project that will be the model used for spreading the awareness campaign across all of District 5300. It's more than just a hashtag, its actually doing something.

According to the FBI, the average age a teen enters the sex trade in the United States is 12 to 14 years old. Many victims are runaway girls who were sexually abused as children. Human trafficking earns global profits of roughly \$150 billion a year for traffickers, \$99 billion of which comes from commercial sexual exploitation.

Confirmed speakers are: **Cozette Vegari, PDG**, who established an awareness campaign in District 5280 and launched a website, Rotarians Fighting Human Trafficking; **Elynne Greene**, manager of the Sex Crimes Bureau for the Las Vegas Metropolitan Police Department and **Kimberly Mull**, child sex trafficking survivor and activist.

In 2018, over half (51.6%) of the criminal human trafficking cases active in this country were sex trafficking cases involving only children. The Nevada Coalition to Prevent the Commercial Sexual Exploitation of Children estimates 5,687 victims of child sex trafficking in Nevada. In Los Angeles, the average age of the first encounter with trafficking is 12–14 years and 11 or 13 years of age for girls and boys, respectively, and they have a 7-year life expectancy after this first encounter. And, 58% of sex trafficked girls in Los Angeles County were foster kids. These statistics are most likely lower than the actual number because it is difficult track all child sex trafficking incidents.
