Rotarians received a ton of information about our local Cedar Springs and Forks Dams from **Matt Howard** from the Mojave Water Agency. To begin, let's do a bit of math. In this article a CFS (cubic feet per second) is equal to 7.48 gallons of water flowing per second. Got it? Ok, let's continue.

The Cedar Springs Dam at Silverwood Lake was built in 1971 as part of the State Water Project. At any given time, a release of water from the dam will happen in a couple of ways. A cone valve underneath the dam will release 450 CFS during a normal storm. During heavy storms, a 6' x 9' gate under the dam can release approximately 8,320 CFS.

The Forks Dam is located in the Mojave River and serves strictly as a flood control device. It can store around 79,000 acre feet of water

David North Sam Lucia Dwight Johnson Al Castellucci and is approximately 160-180 feet high along its north face. The maximum discharge though its outlet is around whopping 23,500 CFS during an El Niño storm! Unlike most dams, the Forks Dam outlet has no gates, meaning that the overflow is directly dependent on the water behind it.

In 1938, there was a great flood in the High Desert that caused not only millions in damages, 87 lost lives, but incredible strong water flow up to 70,000+ CFS through stream gages located throughout the Deep Creek area, all the way to Barstow. Thankfully, with the dams and new technology, we will not see anything like that in our future.

The Mojave Water Agency is a regional wholesale water provider created by High Desert voters in 1960 and governed by a seven member board of directors. The Agency serves 4,900 square miles in San Bernardino County including Barstow, Lucerne Valley, Yucca Valley, the Victor Valley and surrounding communities. The Agency is also one of 29 State Water Contractors with access to California's State Water Project.
