

February 20, 2024 SAFER STREETS..BY THE NUMBERS

After a few delays, the Rotary Club of Victorville was honored to have San Bernardino County Sheriff **Shannon Dicus** join us this week to provide an update on the hard work his department is doing to keep our streets safer.

Operation Consequences is a targeted crime suppression operation focused on reducing violent crime, disrupting, and dismantling targeted criminal street gangs, and locating and arresting criminals illegally possessing, manufacturing, and trafficking firearms.

The San Bernardino County Board

of Supervisors authorized funding for Operation Consequences, allowing for increased law enforcement services to address quality-of-life concerns in our communities.

The operation has allowed the Sheriff's Gangs/Narcotics Division to partner with our Specialized Enforcement Division and patrol stations, California Highway Patrol, San Bernardino County Probation, California Department of Corrections and Rehabilitation, and Department of Homeland Security Investigations. This collaborative effort aims to effectively combat criminal activities and ensure the safety and well-being of our communities.

ILLICIT CANNABIS INDUSTRY

The recent murders of six men in Adelanto serve as a grim reminder of the violence that comes with illicit cannabis operations that continue to plague our region. This illicit industry exploded from small sites to hundreds of large operations in a short amount of time.

In 2016, Prop. 64 the "Legalization of Marijuana" was introduced by the legislature and promised to eradicate the black market and generate billions of dollars in sales revenue. It did the opposite of that.

Prop. 64 reduced some criminal penalties from felonies to misdemeanors, with a mere \$500 fine. The illicit industry grew substantially, bringing with it other illegal activities such as human trafficking, theft, environmental concerns, terrorizing residents and murder.

In 2022, Sheriff Dicus launched Operation Hammer Strike with funding from the County Board of Supervisors to help curtail the violence caused by the hundreds of grow sites illegally operating in our region.
