THE OPTIONS FOR YOUTH SECRETS TO SUCCESS

Not all charter schools are created equal. A Charter School is a public school that may provide instruction in any combination of grades with different purposes. As we heard from **Bryan Gillespie**, who is the Principal of 5 area Options for Youth Charter schools, Options for Youth is about academic recovery for students 3-6 months behind, working with them to get them back and through graduation.



Options for Youth began in Victorville in 1988 by John and Joan Hall, two teachers in Hollywood, who were once dropouts themselves! Out of over 1300 charter schools in California, the most of any state, they were the 13th official charter school but actually the first to open their doors. The school is authorized by the VVUHSD and is a very collaborative relationship over a competitive one.

A 2014 Northeastern University study showed that at the time, 6.5% high school students were dropouts, which comes out to about 3.3 million young people. This dropout rate cost taxpayers \$292,000 over the course of their lives, equaling about 9.6 billion dollars. Other statistics noted are that half of Americans on public assistance are

dropouts and on average, earn \$10,000 less per year than high school graduates.

The school wants to change the perception of dropouts, as they are all not bad kids. Options for Youth was originally a school for independent study to get students to the place of graduation, but now the school has counselors, tutors, student trips, and an overall better High School experience. The school

also offers small classes in English, Math and Science.

Bryan knows that having a high school diploma is not enough and at Options for Youth they are also preparing students for the world after

high school and the school grew as a result by adding counselors at each location, special ed staff, English language learner supports and full time math tutors.

The school as also increased extra curricular activities such as sports, field trips, plus senior activities such as a Prom, Grad Night, and Senior Breakfast. The

school has added experiential learning at no cost to the students. Some examples of this learn has been trips to a ranch in Colorado, San Fransisco, Washington D.C., a CSI trip in Las Vegas, community service in New Orleans, college tours and even international trips to Cuba, Italy and China. If that was not enough they also have added a Scholarship Program and created community partnerships where the



student must do 10 hours of community service to graduate.

When Covid took the world by storm, Options for Youth was ready, and not even on purpose. They already had a strong independent study component and virtual platform in place with Chromebooks for each student. They quickly got to their feet and back running virtually within 2 weeks. A small number on staff continued to work on site at their three locations in Victorville and two in Hesperia, but there were still some struggles as teachers could not connect as easily to their students and extra curricular activities and experiential learning had to stop during the height of the pandemic.

Currently, 92% of students are back on site, and the sports program has made a return, mainly soccer, which began last month. They did a field trip to see "Hamilton" and have had one college tour. Most importantly, there has been a lot of talk about learning loss because of Covid. Learning loss is what Options for Youth have specialized correcting for over 30 years!
