#### A ROUNDABOUT WAY TO GET THROUGH THE VILLAGE

The High Desert is constantly changing and Rotarians this week found out that the historic Apple Valley Village will be part of it, thanks to **Rob Kilpatrick**, Senior Project Manager/Senior Associate with Dave Evans and Associates.

The Apple Valley Village, one of the first commercial landmarks in the area, is due for an upgrade, but getting in and out of the frontage roads has been a challenge. In the 50's and 60's it was not a problem, as there were naturally fewer cars on the road, but in 2022, it can be a nightmare at times.





This plan breaks up the Village into five districts, each with specific uses and developers. Land uses such as commercial, retail, office/professional, entertainment, restaurants, residential and recreation. Specific business




types vary by Districts include car sale lots, convenience stores, drive-thru eateries, hospitals and convalescent facilities, schools, bed & breakfast inns, churches, and multiuse developments.

On the proposed places for a multi-use development includes the large, almost vacant shopping center on Yucca Loma and Navajo Roads. This area in the future could combine a multi-story concept, with retail stores on the bottom floor and multi-family living on the upper floors.

One of the biggest challenges has been the frontage roads. These roads, known as Outer Hwy 18, leave much to be desired with traffic, lack of pedestrian walking space and how to cross over from each side easily. Rob's plan is to make the frontage roads one-way streets on either side which will allow room for expanded sidewalks. Also, there is the plan to add more traffic signals to give more opportunities for visitors to cross the street.

With this plan to make it easier for people to shop in the village, there comes the discussion of parking. The plan also includes the use of vacant land in the



Village to create municipal parking lots, where area business can buy spaces for their customers if they choose. This could allow for over 700 spaces for potential shoppers.

One of the biggest challenges facing Rob and his team is the traffic flow and just how to finally connect Yucca Loma Road with Highway 18. The answer for that is roundabouts. The plan calls for three main roundabouts

on Highway 18 to starting at a new Yucca Loma intersection, at Navajo Road and at the Central Road intersection. Along with that, there are proposed smaller roundabouts at three key areas of the frontage roads at Pawnee, Quinault and Hitt Road, allowing easy entry and exit from the one way roads.
