> Deep inside the paper's office in Victorville lies 82 years of print archives going back to 1937! These archives tell some of the story of our region, and the paper offers residents a sense of community. Did you know that Oro Grande was once bigger than Victorville? Hard to imagine, but true.

A lot of people say that the newspaper industry is dead, but Matt disagrees, it is just changing rapidly, and the paper is a still a bit behind. In the past, a reporter

had one job, report the news, but now with a smaller staff Matt juggles a variety of roles such as handling all online publishing, editing reports, social media and working with freelancers who cover sporting events. The community at times sees the paper as a frustration, but Matt has a deep love for the Daily Press.

While some still get the paper delivered daily to their homes, more and more residents are going to vvdailypress. com for their local news. On an average Tuesday, they will see 13,000 page views from 7,800 visitors with 1,800 shares. So far since the year began, there have been over 2 million page views!

Matthew Cabe and the rest of the staff at the Daily Press have a challenging job, and sometimes dangerous. Also, with social media, everyone is a reporter, which leads to "Fake News". But Matt wouldn't have it any other way.


