MISSING A FRIEND, A MOM, & A DOG NAMED AUTUMN

The definition of "Ethics" is: moral principles that govern a person's behavior or the conducting of an activity. Rotarians heard that this week at the annual George Hensel Ethics Essay Competition. Hosted by **Dr. Ron Boyd**, the essays have previously been read and awarded, but for most Club members, this was their first time hearing them.



Student **Megan Metzler** from CIST was unable to attend due to a test, so Dr. Boyd stood in to read her essay. Megan wrote about how she grew up playing soccer her whole life. She has had the same tight circle of teammates as her friends since childhood. In time, she became Team Captain, and things seemed to be going well until her best friend became influenced by others and began

bullying her teammates. Megan's ethical dilemma was deciding if she wanted to attempt to resolve the issue with her friend. She also needed to decide if it was easier to avoid a situation that would very likely end badly. Doing the right thing meant looking past the years of friendship and determining if a bullying type of behavior was acceptable. When faced with a dilemma, Megan defines ethics as deciding what's most important, whether it only affects you or everyone. In the end, the friendship was lost, but her teammates stood behind her and now have become her greatest friends.

George R. Hensel Ethics Essay Contest is designed to challenge high school students to analyze ethical issues and concerns confronting them in today's complex world. Rotarian, businessman, and philanthropist, **George R. Hensel**, Ph.D., privately funded this contest before his death in 2012. Students submit essays to their local Rotary Clubs and may, at the club's discretion, present their essays at a club meeting. Winners at the club level advance to the District Level and four winners at that level are awarded monetary prizes. The top three runners-up receive cash prizes of \$500 each, plus \$200 for their teacher, and the winner at the District Level gets \$3,000 plus \$1,000 for his/her teacher. The overall winning essay is presented at the District Conference.

her best friend. They loved to play, sleep, and go hiking together. The dog was a huge comfort to her during the Covid-19 Pandemic. As Autumn became older, she noticed that she was having trouble walking downstairs and soon began having problems balancing. When it came time for online classes, she was up an hour before classes, cooking breakfast for her dad who had work and mom who was sleeping or

just waking up. She'd clean up, get dressed, and log onto her classes with her camera on and would interact with her teacher and other students. She had only been in school for less than a week when it had happened, her mom passed away. Jada's biggest support, the one who encouraged whatever decision, career path, or action was gone. As she started experiencing true grief, Jada stopped doing everything she once did. She was never up on time and waited until the last minute to join her online classes. Jada didn't bother to turn on her camera and stopped talking and interacting with the class. She didn't even take notes anymore. Jada slept through all her classes. Jada's ethical dilemma was to either pick herself back up and keep working towards her goal or give up completely. Through teachers and close friends, Jada is still trying to climb her way back up, and struggles some days, having a hard time breathing or running to the bathroom and just start breaking down into tears. For Jada, ethics are someone's morals and principles that makes them who they are. She is going forward to obtain her goals, as her mother would want her to do.

The runners up received checks for \$75 and Jada, as the winner was presented with a check for \$150. Her essay will be judged at the District Conference for the championship. We are rooting for you, Jada, but not just for the essay contest...

Dr. Ron Boyd had the chance to grab the Blue Dice, but picked a white one and saved the chance for another Rotarian.


The pot continues to grow next week with 6 Dice and \$400 for the lucky Rotarian who can grab the Blue Dice.
