March 15, 2022 WHAT ARE YOU WANNA DO WITH YOUR LIFE?

Do you remember being asked what you wanted to do after you graduated from high school and did not know the answer? **Ami Popineau**, Career Pathways Coordinator for Options for Youth Charter School, asks students that question all the time. To help point students in the right path to success, being a WIOA School certainly helps.

As shared with **Bryan Gillespie** a couple weeks ago, Options for Youth is a free public charter school; with 5

locations in the High Desert, serving both junior high and high school students. Options for Youth students can either achieve a high school diploma or get credit recovery to go back to a traditional school.

WIOA stands for the Workforce Innovation Opportunities Act. It is a Federal Act that was signed into law in 2015 to offer adults and youth workforce education and support to strengthen and grow the US labor force. It offers federal funds to all states and those states filter those funds into each of their counties to invest in WIOA organizations and programs.

Being a WIOA School allows Options for Youth to bring success directly to their students. The school offers the 14 elements of WIOA and umbrella services. These elements include tutoring, dropout

prevention, support services, financial literacy education, guidance counseling, leadership development, entrepreneurial skills, occupational training, paid work experience and other career pathway education.

A career pathway education gives a student insight on what possible career they'd like to explore and educational opportunities that match their interests. The best thing is that it is not set in stone and students can

change their career choices if they choose.

The career pathways education includes a Creative Path which focuses on information technology, art, A/V technology, and communication. There is a Health Path for those interested in health services and a Nature Path for the agriculture market. Also available is a Helping Path which includes law enforcement, public safety, government, and public administration, plus hospitality and tourism. A Building/Fixing Path is great for those interested in architecture, construction, manufacturing, and transportation. Finally, a Business Path is geared for business management, marketing, and finance.

Student leadership also plays a big role on student success at Options for Youth. The Student Council raises money for charities, collect items to donate to local homeless shelters and promote food drives around the holidays. They also volunteer to help with a variety of school events. This year the Student Leadership Council competed in the Mojave Water Agency Problem Solvers Competition. They were challenged to find a solution to the problem with unregulated wells in the County and the issues it creates for unsafe drinking water.

Another highlight is the Entrepreneurial Skills WIOA Path. Within this class students are assigned to create a business idea and write a business plan. All the students who take part in the program compete with other Options for Youth students throughout California in their own "Shark Tank" Competition.

Another avenue for students is paid internships and work experience with WIOA partners. Students chosen must have a good standing with the program, turn in their work on time, and have an expressed interest in a certain career path. One such partner is Goodwill. The Goodwill stores help the community but also WIOA students vocational training and job placement.

Options for Youth students find success in WIOA by getting trained and educated for their career interests while still in high school. This goes a long way to help a student decide what they would like to study in college. It beats spending all that money at an expensive school and then deciding it's not the right career path.
