SACRAMENTO PERSPECTIVE FROM A RETIRED SENATOR



Anthony Adams was a member of the California State Assembly, representing California's 59th Assembly District as a Republican. He was first elected to the state assembly in 2006, and served for four years. He spoke this week to the Rotary Club of Victorville about the common pitfalls and internal friction of government. He spelled out how government *should be* our partner, and that everyone's idea of "the com-

mon good" is not the same; we don't all share the same world views, which makes partnering a daunting task. It is always a dilemma for our legislators and congress; how do we bring everyone together for a common purpose?



Anthony shared with us, "What I learned in my four years in Sacramento?"...

- (1) Compromise is not a four-letter word.
- (2) If you want to get something accomplished, you have to be willing to sometimes give.
- (3) The truth of the matter is, I'm never going to see the world the same

as my friends on the other side of the aisle do, or my neighbor does.

- (4) If we share a common purpose, we can find a way to get there together.
- (5) Getting most of the way there is better than getting no way at all.
- (6) In the face of what's right, you have to be willing to stand up to those who fundamentally disagree with you, and you have to take it on the chin, and I learned that lesson hard in 2009 when faced with voting for tax increases.

FINE & RAFFLE SESSION:




Matt Drake entertained Rotarians this week, and as quick as David North could scoot out the door, Matt caught him with a \$10 fine! Nice try,
