March 23, 2021 THE HISTORY OF SPRING VALLEY LAKE

There is a lot of history here in the High Desert, and our Club is very lucky to have members who have quite an extensive knowledge of the area. In addition to **Terry Caldwell** (who we will hear from next week), we also have **Stew Anderson**! This week, Stew, along with guest **Al Logan** from the Spring



Valley Lake Association shared the history, past and present of the "Jewel of the Desert".

The Boise Cascade Corporation acquired the land and developed the projected layout of SVL in 1968 and the following year, the company broke ground and began to develop the land, formally Kalin Ranch, a cattle property.

Of course, Spring Valley Lake is made famous by its massive man-made lake, which began development in September 1969. Huge earth moving equipment moved a total of 5.2 million cubic years of dirt to create a 200-acre plastic lined lake. The equipment was the largest assemblage on a private project in San Bernardino County. Seven months later the lake was completed, consisting of 200 surface acres and 7 miles of shoreline. At its maximum lake it is 6000 feet long and the depth ranges from 9 feet to 22 feet.

construction began on the 164-acre course in early 1970 and features three different types of grass; the fairways consist of a special blend of Marion Kentucky Blue, while Congressional Bent on the greens, and Funking Blue grass on the tees. There are over 100 bunkers over the 6,518 yards of the course, plus eight water hazards and meandering trout streams. Stew shared that he, as



well as his golf balls, have visited all of these b u n k e r s and water h a z a r d s. For the golf

aficionados, the course is Par 72 and is not classed as a long layout, but it does stress accuracy and fitness.

Another popular attraction to residents of Spring Valley Lake is the Equestrian Estates and Center. The EQ is on 466 acres and all lots are on a half-acre and of course zoned for horses. The

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Center was completed in 1973 and opened a year later at the cost of \$450,000. The Center covers five acres itself and consists of dining, bar, two stable barns, stud barns, hay storage barns and a paved parking lot.

To keep things secure and safe inside SVL is their own security force that has been active since 1974, and in 1977 the area got its own Fire Department. All SVL Fire Fighters are property owners or employees of Spring Valley Lake.



Next, SVL General Manager Alfred Logan spoke for a few minutes on the future of SVL. Currently, there are 20 different home styles in development with just 70 lots not yet developed, and even less, 17, in the Equestrian area. Those keeping an eye on current real estate trends, know that it won't be long until all lots are developed. In the past, homes inside SVL were used as vacation homes or rental properties, and currently there are over 1,000 rental properties inside Spring Valley Lake, but that number is dwindling due to rental restrictions in place and more sales from homeowners, as they see more profit from sales than rentals. Now there are more full families taking advantage of SVL amenities.

Going forward, the Association is looking into purchasing the Country Club to keep it community owned and operated, plus more amenities to help Spring Valley Lake continue to grow for those who are Ok to live a unique lifestyle living under an HOA.


