Business is always evolving and so are the laws, so it is a great reminder to have **Sharon Page**, from HR Edge, come and speak to the Club on some of the things we, as business leaders, need to know to stay out of trouble this year.

Smart phones now come with the ability to download Timekeeping Apps and more companies are requiring employees to verify the accuracy of their records and encourage

them to report discrepancies with these apps, which will protect you in case you are sued by an employee who say their did not get paid for work done.

The Parent Leave Act requires companies w i t h 2 0 - 4 9

parental leave to bond with their child within 1 year of birth, adoption or foster care.

The new minimum wage for 26 or more employees is \$11.00/hour, while companies with 25 or fewer, are required to pay \$10.50/hour.

The Fair Play Act is no longer "equal pay for equal work". In 2018 it is more along the lines of equal pay for substantially similar work. In years gone by this used to be based on gender (sex), but now it also applies to race and ethnicity. Any pay discrepancies must be defended based on a merit system, seniority, quantity or quality of production standards.

Have you heard of "Ban the Box"? Most Rotarians had not hear of this, and raised a lot of questions. On a job application any potential employee used to have to check a box stating whether they had ever been convicted of a crime. When it was checked, we most likely tossed it in the trash. This year that question cannot be asked on a job application. The question cannot be asked until after the initial job interview, and a conditional offer of employment has been extended. After a background check has been done, if there is due cause not to hire, then there is a processes to rescind the conditional offer of employment on a case by case basis.

Finally there is the #MeToo Movement. This is not going away and more harassment cases are coming all of the time. To protect your company and yourself make sure you pass out any approved literature against harassment and retaliation, allow staff different avenues to report complaints and take all reports seriously. Another effective tool Sharon has found is not only providing harassment training for managers, but to employees as well, so they can know what behaviors they need to change and notice signs of others harassing.
