California's Role in the Civil War

For most people California and the American Civil War have nothing in common but our speaker this week, Victor Valley College Professor of History, **David Wilkerson**, showed that California played a significant role leading up to the start of the war. Between 1949 and 1865, California was intimately involved in the major issues of the day and had a direct impact on the lead up and outcome of the Civil War.

The Compromise of 1850 began due to divisions over slavery in territory gained in the Mexican-American War that was resolved in the Compromise of 1850. It consisted of laws admitting California as a free state, creating Utah

and New Mexico territories with the question of slavery in each to be determined by popular sovereignty, settling a Texas-New Mexico boundary dispute in the former's favor, ending the slave trade in Washington, D.C., and making it easier for



southerners to recover fugitive slaves.* In exchange, the south was guaranteed that no federal restrictions on slavery would be placed on Utah or New Mexico. Texas lost its boundary claims in New Mexico, but the Congress compensated Texas with \$10 million. Slavery was maintained in the nation's capital, but the slave trade was prohibited. Finally, and most controversially, a FUGITIVE SLAVE LAW was passed, requiring northerners to return runaway slaves to their owners under penalty of law.**

Beginning in 1848, the Gold Rush made a huge impact as well. The discovery of gold upset the balance of power in the US Senate. When John Marshall discovered gold in California, he and others were told to keep it quiet, but President Taylor made it public and suddenly people from all over the U.S., the Orient, Europe, South America, etc. descended on California which made it a true melting pot.

Since California was a free state, it became a sanctuary for runaway slaves. As Professor Wilkerson stated, it is interesting how history repeats itself, as certain California cities want to be "Sanctuary Cities", not for slaves of course, but for illegal immigrants.

As the Civil War began, the state's involvement included sending gold east, recruiting volunteer combat units to replace regular forces in territories of the Western United States, maintaining and building numerous camps and fortifications, suppressing secessionist activity (many of these secessionists went east to fight for the Confederacy) and securing the New Mexico Territory against the Confederacy. Militia groups were also set up to guard the Arizona and New Mexico lines. In all, about 16,000 Californians fought against the Confederacy to fight to free the slaves.
