# **Helping Those Who Cannot Help Themselves**

This week we got to hear from **Cari Thomas**, Regional Director for the Inland Empire United Way, Desert Communities Region. Cari shared some alarming facts about our County, and what the United Way is doing to make a difference. In the Inland Empire, 1 in 4 children are now living in poverty. The Riverside-San Bernardino-Ontario area has the highest poverty rate of any of the nation's 25 largest metropolitan areas, with San Bernardino alone having 28.3% in child poverty and 20.4% of adults in California. In the Inland Empire, only 38% of residents have

> a college education, and the Riverside/San Bernardino County area is ranked last among the 25 largest metro areas in the US in the area of education, health and income levels.

Even though non-profits like themselves and others are starving for resources, Cari and her team at the United Way are working hard through a variety of programs.

They start by meeting the basic family needs by providing academic support and guidance through such programs 2-1-1, Kids Pack, School Tools and more. **2-1-1** is a phone number you can call for help. They have assisted over 65,000 families who are in need of critical health and social services. *Kids Pack* feeds over 1800 homeless and very low income school children by taking over where the school breakfast and lunch programs end; by providing food to eat on the weekends. Without this program, kids run the risk of not eating again until the following Monday morning. *School Tools* equips low income students with school supplies and tools needed for academic success. Other United Way programs include the *Mentor Connection*, providing guidance and role models in people's lives and *Promise Scholars*, that helps prepare our young people for College and Career readiness.

The office that Cari Thomas runs in Apple Valley is not subsidized by the State Government or even the larger IEUW. They raise all resources themselves and keep those resources right here in our Victor Valley. Some of the ways the community assists is by companies volunteering one day for two hours filling that week's Kids Pack food baskets, or holding a drive for school supplies for the School Tools project.

As a Rotarian, it is out utmost duty to assist others less fortunate and to be a gift to the world, and we are thankful there are people like Cari Thomas, who are doing the same through the United Way, by assisting our children locally, to provide them a path through life that can be without poverty and suffering.


# **RYLA Students Share Their Experiences**
