WHEN YOU SEE THE RIVER FLOW

A Mojave River event. That is what it is called when water actually flows above ground, as well as below ground. Speaking to the Club this week was Mojave Water Agency Hydrogeologist **Tony Winkel**. These events happen every 10 years or so in the High Desert when we accumulate lots of rain. The last time this happened was in 2011, twelve years ago.



water recharging event, building up our supply of water we have used previously in our region.

A watershed is a land area that channels rainfall and snowmelt to creeks, streams, and rivers, and eventually to outflow points such as reservoirs, bays, or the ocean. These rains have resulted in 173,000 acre feet of water, the High Desert has now had 97,000 acre feet of water soaked into the ground. Helendale

has received 7,350 acre feet of water, while Barstow as 5,000 and Baker at the end received 600 acre feet of water.

The above ground overflow really caused people to notice it after the January 17th storm, which took the river flowing water all the way to Barstow, but retreated back to Helendale in February. With the large storms in March, the river then pushed forward, all the way to Afton Canyon, and last month went back to flowing above ground to Barstow. Currently if you go to Highway 173, south of Hesperia, the water is still gently flowing, but even over the Yucca Loma Bridge, it is slowly rescinding each week. If our rainfall season is done, then our riverbeds may be dry again by Memorial Day. The great news is that the water we rely on here at home, is flowing wonderfully underground.

While many people are talking about how beautiful Mojave River looks right now with the water flow, it is not as big of an event as it seems to be happening. According to Tony, the biggest in recent years took place during the storm season of 2005. Sadly, as residents of the High Desert we are still using more water than is naturally available, and we still need to do our part and conserve water whenever we can. This year while Hesperia and Apple Valley received about 6" of rain, the watershed in the San Bernardino Mountains averaged about 48" of downpour. When the first rain came in December not much happened as the watershed acts like a dry sponge. Once it is saturated after the second and third rains, it starts to flow on top of the ground, while a majority flows underground from the mountains and ends all the way in Baker, CA. We rely solely on this ground water in the High Desert. The entire river acts as a thirsty sponge and has been saturated across the Victor Valley.

The river loses water as it flows and goes underground, to the ground water we rely on. What you see when you see the Mojave River flowing right now is called a ground
