HOW TO SELL A CAR YOU'VE NEVER SEEN

If you've driven by the Greiner Buick GMC lot in Victorville, it looks kind of barren. In the midst of the Covid-19 pandemic, **David Greiner** shared with our Club that the reason for this was consumers buying more vehicles because they had the money to spend due to stimulus and vacation destinations being closed.

Funny thing, that was over a year ago and

the lot still looks empty. David returned this week and shared that this is now a result of a chip shortage around the whole automotive industry. All electronic devises use a generic semiconductor chip to operate. There are only two companies in the world who make these chips and they are sold on a first come, first served basis, and if you don't buy at your correct time, you basically go to the back of the line.

Between the GM Motors Strike in 2019 and the Covid-19 pandemic, the Auto Industry were prepared for their turn, but when the pandemic closed the industry, the auto makers didn't purchase which allowed China to come in and buy them all! Now, there is a major chip shortage globally, and has hit the auto market in a unique way. According to CNBC, Nissan is reportedly leaving navigation systems out of cars that would normally have them, while Ram Trucks has stopped equipping its 1500 pickups with a standard "intelligent" rearview mirror that monitors for blind

spots. The vehicles David sells are also limited on the electronic "extras". There are just not enough chips to go around.

When it comes to selling vehicles at the dealership, it's a whole new game. For most dealerships, having a 90-day supply of cars is par for the industry. David has five. That means his team are selling cars to people who have to wait for them, some

are even making a couple payments on their new car or truck even before they have driven it!

For consumers the range of supply for vehicles due to the chip storage is staggering. On the lower end of the spectrum, the National/Regional Stock Supply shows the wait for the GMC Yukon is 5 days, but for a Buick Encore, the wait is an incredible 48 days! When a fleet of cars gets delivered to Greiner, they have already been sold and wont be put on the showroom floor or on the lot.

For a company like Greiner Buick GMC, they are working though the shortage and making changes when needed to survive this. The problem really is hitting the bigger dealerships very hard, who survive by having hundreds of cars on their lots, and now have very few.

Another result is the chip shortage is the demand for used cars. Consumers are so desperate to get a car now, that sellers are in a position to sell their cars for well over their value.

When will this chip shortage end? Industry leaders are forecasting this will be over in the 2nd quarter of 2022. Sounds like it is a great time to sell that old car you don't want anymore.
