FULFILLING OUR NATION'S PROMISE...

The Uncle of **Richard Rorex** was killed in a mortar shell battle in World War II, and they are still looking for his remains. Richard spoke to our Club this week about the DPAA, the Defense POW/MIS Accounting Agency, a government agency he has been partnering with for the past 8 years. Over those 8 years, Richard has been attending family updates with them and has seen the time, effort and resources that are put into identifying the remains of POW's and MIA's. In 2018 alone, 203 remains were found and out of those, 174 were from WWII.

provide accurate information back to the families. Using DNA results, the agency is comprised of more than 600 skilled and talented civilians and military from all branches, and include historians, research analysts, archivists, anthropologists, archaeologists, as well as numerous support personnel. These people, along with other U.S. and foreign specialists, research, investigate, recover and identify remains of Americans unaccounted for from World War II, the Korean War, the Vietnam War, the Cold War and the Iraq and Persian Gulf Wars. Recently, 37 remains were recovered from North Korea and as of this date, 12 soldiers from the Korean war, have been identified.

The search for unaccounted Americans starts with in depth research by DPAA historians and analysts. At any one time there are more than 1,000 active cases under investigation. Recovery operations take charge to excavate sites and a recovery team of 10-14 people, including a team leader, forensic anthropologist and more work for 35 to 60 days depending on the location and terrain of the recovery.

Once that is completed, remains are brought back to the DPAA labs in Hawaii or Nebraska for identification. Hawaii is the largest and most scientifically diverse forensic skeletal laboratory in the world, where all possible remains and material recovered from the field recovery site are stored and analyzed.

Once an identification is complete, the information is transferred to the appropriate branch of service, which personally informs the family of the identification.

There are more than 100,000 remains that are still missing with 75,000 of them from WWII. Many of these are lost at sea, so the recovery is tough, but still ongoing.

Richard doesn't know if he will ever get identification of his uncle, but is so thankful the DPAA is there for many other families. Find out more at DPAA.MIL
