#### June 15, 2021 THE GROWTH OF THE MARIJUANA BLACK MARKET

One would expect that when marijuana was legalized three years ago the criminal aspect of growing and selling would decrease, but the opposite has happened! So much so it is a challenge for Detective **Chris Bassett** and the other members of the Marijuana Enforcement Team. The team is a division of the San Bernardino County Sheriff Department and consists of four investigators and a sergeant responsible for mid to major



marijuana crimes over the 20,105 square miles that make up the County of San Bernardino. The team is responsible for capturing illegal marijuana grows, both indoor and outdoor, cultivation in National Parks and illegal dispensaries.

One big reason for the rise in marijuana crimes is the fact that it is now a misdemeanor, and not a felony to illegally grow, so when someone gets caught it's just a \$500 fine. Nevertheless so far the team has taken down some 800 illegal grows. What is allowed for an adult 21 years or older include up to six plants, 1 ounce of bud, and up to eight grams on concentrated marijuana. If an individual lives in the outlying county property, they can have anywhere from 12 - 30 plants!

To grow or open a dispensary legally comes with some very expensive licensing. An individual needs a license from both the State of California and the City/County they want to open in. The State License will cost them \$100,000 per year plus a percentage tax to California. This makes it extremely hard for a legal dispensary to make a profit so what do they do? They buy their marijuana from the black market, and hence the rise in criminal activity

for legalized marijuana.

They may look the same but marijuana and hemp are vastly different. They both come from the Cannabis Sativa Plant, but hemp comes from a different strain of the plant. Hemp also has high CBD (for pain relief) and marijuana has high THC (Get High). When the team busts an illegal grow, a lot of the time it is from people applying for a hemp farms, but in actuality, they are growing weed.

While Indoor grows have doubled over the last several years, the outdoor grows have quadrupled! The team began to see the rise in outdoor grows on private lands in 2013. They started out as simple enclosures made of plywood but due to temperature changes it made growing a seasonal activity. A year later they began to see makeshift greenhouses which allowed for year round cultivation. In 2021, most outdoor grows consist solely of greenhouses, some complete with a sophisticated system of fans, lighting controls, and swamp coolers. Plants are grown either in pots or directly in the soil. If you drive along Hwy 395 between Adelanto and Kramer Junction after dark you will see a lot of outdoor grows.

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#### **MARIJUANA ILLEGAL GROWTH**

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Illegal indoor grows are much deadlier. Many times they are right in one's own neighborhood. Some telltale signs include constantly closed blinds, small bathroom windows always open for cross air flow, debris stuck on windows, blacked out garage door windows and 8 - 10 A/C Units. It takes a lot of electricity to grow marijuana, and in an effort to not get caught, many of these illegal indoor grows do an electrical bypass. Electrical lines are tapped into before they pass through the meter. The electricity is then routed to a sub panel and then to the growing equipment. Because the electricity does not pass through the meter and is not counted and therefore stolen, and can be considered a felony if they steal \$950 worth of electricity.

Some of these houses end up going up in flames and dangering the lives of not only themselves but their neighbors. Electrocutions are caused by exposed wiring, combined with lots of water being used, and explosions come from the use of cheap aluminum wires, which melt at lower temperatures than copper wiring. These fires usually happen at the electrical bypass point. Health wise, because growing marijuana needs lots of heat and lots of moisture, many of these homes develop dangerous levels of black mold!

In 2020 alone the team conducted 599 search warrants, confiscated over 300,000 plants and made well over 250 arrests. If you'd like to report an illegal grow whether indoors or outdoors, please call the San Bernardino County Sheriff Narcotics Division at 909-387-8400 or email narc-met@sbcsd.org
