June 22, 2021 THE FUTURE OF HOSPITAL CARE IN THE HIGH DESERT

A new hospital is coming and according to **John Kozyra** from Providence St. Mary, it will be a state of the art hospital that people will want to work at and will be able to take better care of High Desert patients.

The new hospital is a joint venture with Kaiser Permanente with a goal of a great patient experience for the community. The plan began 14 years ago in 2017 when St. Mary purchased 98 Acres on the south side of the 15 Freeway between Bear Valley Road and Main Street. In 2012, they had an

official groundbreaking, and then with the merger with Providence and eventually Covid, slowed the process down, but with the joint venture with Kaiser, it's all systems go with a One Billion dollar investment on this 260+ bed hospital that will be completed by 2027. The Kaiser partnership is a great fit because they are a likeminded partner with the same goals of quality, safety and a great patient experience. They will also be able to serve the 100,000+ members in the High Desert.

The biggest question John gets asked is if there will now be two hospitals from St. Mary, and the simple answer is no. After a billion

dollar price tag, there is not much more they are able to do but put all their energies into this new facility. Another reason goes with their mission to express God's healing love, witnessed through the ministry of Jesus to be steadfast in serving all. This hospital will bring bigger and better service to the community.

Another advantage to this hospital are the patient rooms. The days of paired rooms will be over as all the rooms will be private rooms at the new hospital and will be part of a better

patient experience with 20% more beds then the current hospital.

What is needed in the High Desert is more primary care doctors and specialists and with this much more convenient location right off the freeway will make it easier to recruit more specialty physicians. The travel time from Apple Valley to the new campus will be approximately 12-15 minutes, Adelanto and Phelan residents will get there in 18-20 minutes and those who reside in Lucerne Valley can expect a 30 minutes journey to the new hospital.

If you have ever been to the Emergency Room at Providence St. Mary or any other hospital in the High Desert, you know it can be chaotic and a very long wait, sometimes all night. Part of the goal of this new facility is community education to help people understand what needs should go to Emergency, an Urgent Care Facility, Telehealth, or their Primary Care Doctor. Utilizing Urgent Care and Telehealth will keep many people out of the Emergency Room. When it comes to Primary Care Doctors, the High Desert needs to grow with at least 30 new doctors. If utilized properly and

the community learns the differences, the hospital will be sufficient with 260 beds through 2035 with room to grow.

The final issue they faced was what to do with Providence St. Mary in Apple Valley? The hospital needs to be retrofit for earthquakes that would cost 400 Million, or spend 40 Million to close and decommission the hospital. They could also sell it to a developer who would turn it into something else entirely, but they have chosen to repurpose the facility for medical services, without in-patient care. They are forming a community committee group to advise the options and plans for repurposing the campus. The goal is to keep medical services in Apple Valley.

Providence St. Mary, along with Kaiser, wants to create a better patient experience, with private rooms and a team of doctors and specialists to take care of the needs of the community.
