July 12, 2022 WHAT THEY DON'T DO AT MDAQMD

This week, Mojave Desert Air Quality Management District Communications Analyst (MDAQMD) **Martial Haprov** spoke to the Club about the questions they get asked the most about MDAQMD, and the 20,000 square miles of air quality they are responsible for.

The first question they get asked is about air pollution and air quality and what they do about car pollution. MDAQMD

has regulatory authority over stationary sources, but don't oversee mobile sources such as cars, boats, trains and more. 70% of air pollution comes from moving vehicles, and the District provides programs to help assist to reduce emissions, but don't have authority over them.

The next question they get many phone calls over is for people seeking a burn permit. The MDAQMD does not issue burn permits. Some air quality management districts do issue them, but in the High Desert, that is handled by our local fire districts. Residents can go to their local fire stations to obtain a permit. The MDAQMD will send out notices whether any day is a burn day or not in the Victor Valley. If you hear local

TV news or radio making burn day announcements, it is likely made by the South Coast Air Quality Management District, which covers Los Angeles County.

The third and final question they receive deals with smoke advisories, caused by wildfires. Most people don't think about MDAQMD in their daily lives (unless they are regulated by the District), but when there is a wildfire and/or smoke advisory issued, their phones,

emails and social media light up. When an advisory is issued the big question is why are schools not closed? Martial reminded everyone that the District is not a public health agency and they don't have the authority to close area schools. That decision lies with our local school districts. They have the authority to close anything from one school to all in their district.

He concluded his talk by sharing that we have great air quality in the High Desert and if you can see 10 miles or more, the air quality is good. When the quality degrades, they cannot demand, but will recommend tips for children, seniors and those with respiratory issues, on how to reduce exposure.

So then what does the MDAQMD do? As the air pollution control agency for San Bernardino County's High Desert and Riverside County's Palo Verde Valley, the District has primary responsibility for regulating stationary sources of air pollution located within its jurisdictional boundaries. The District implements air quality programs required by state and federal mandates, enforces rules and regulations based on air pollution laws and educates businesses and residents about their role in protecting air quality and the risks of air pollution.
