#### The Real Estate Side of COVID-19

here in the high Desert spoke to the Club about how COVID-19 has affected the local real estate market.

It seems every decade there is a recession, sometimes moderate and sometimes major we have seen in the past. As 2020 began, Coldwell Banker had their biggest January in 10 years, and Jason was just waiting for the bubble to burst

again, and when Coronavirus became a reality, he was actually relieved.

Now, no one really knew what was going to happen, so the company chose to cut all costs in accounting but doubled their advertising budget. The housing market was nervous at first with inspectors not wanting to go to homes and Realtors were leery of showing homes. But as buyers and sellers got more comfortable in late April into May, for the first time in several years they had 476 new escrows! People adjusted easily to changes such as virtual walk-throughs and more. Today, if you sell a reasonably priced home, you can expect 15-25 offers pretty quickly!

Over in the commercial area, Jason has seen a lot of investors

taking their money out the Stock Market and put it into real estate. The truth is that there is low inventory, and ZOOM has impacted the market for needed office space and made it very vulnerable.

The retail market will also be affected because of the pandemic. Many of the smaller "Mom & Pop" shops will not make it through. Many medium

box stores also run a big risk, as more people began shopping online with Amazon and others while stuck at home. Stores like Best Buy and Bed Bath and Beyond will be most at risk by online shopping and those buildings will be hard to fill with new tenants. A perfect example if the old WalMart on Bear Valley Road, which has remained vacant for the past 6 years. Single tenant locations such as Jack in the Box and US Bank should do fine.

The Multi-Family Market is doing very well due to the housing shortage. The sad fact is that there is not enough building here in the High Desert and soon this market will become full.

Finally in the Industrial sector, there is a shortage of product. Where there is space is in Adelanto, but that city is still charging a premium for cost per square footage due to its location in the cannabis zone.


