THE UNKNOWN KNOWS

Last time James Quigg spoke to the Rotary Club of Victorville, he was the Chief Photographer at the Daily Press. But today, he serves in another career as a teacher of middle and high school students.

James is still involved with the Daily Press, but only for scheduled events. Usually, he will be booked at the quickest 2-3 hours in advance, whereas before he had around 5 minutes to be at a location. Most bookings for the newspaper are now made weeks or months in advance.

James officially left the Daily Press in August of 2019 to take a position at Encore School for the Arts, but very soon was offered to

become the Photography Art and Yearbook teacher for middle and high school classes.

While the career change was planned, the speed of it was not. James had a window of only two weeks to be a teacher for the first time! As inspiration, James took a favorite quote of his from Donald Rumsfeld as inspiration, "Reports to say

that something hasn't happened are always interesting to me, because as we know, there are known knowns; things we know we know. We also known there are known unknowns; that is to say there are some things we do not know. But there are also the unknown unknowns. The ones we don't know we don't know". Some of those known unknowns for James was taking a job a week after the start of school, finding out that all teaching materials were deleted and had to prepare curriculum in the evenings, the challenges of teaching photography during Covid on Zoom and even post Covid, plus finding out that teaching may be routine, but it's never the same.

For James it took about 3-4 months for things to settle down and while he now has a set schedule, some students love their assignment in one class, while the same one for the next class may find it completely boring.

There were also things about teaching that James didn't know, that are now known. He doesn't teach photography but uses photography to teach teenagers to be adults. Some of the lessons he teaches through photography assignments deal with the value of work ethics, avenues to success and more. Each assignment has some sort of life lesson attached to it. James also found out that the best lesson students can learn are the ones they teach themselves. He shared that he will break their brains with challenges, but give them time to fix it themselves to show the strength of being able to overcome the hurdles they are faced with. Continued on page 2
