When it comes to social media, no one is more of an expert than **Sue Moore**. As the owner of Moore Digital Marketing, she works with many different clients, in different industries on how to use social media to get the best impact for connecting with existing customers, and landing new clients.

How big is social media as the new way the world communicates? If Facebook was a country, then it would be the largest nation on the earth! Social media is a form of electronic communication, through which users create Online communities to share information, ideas, personal messages and other content, such as photos and videos.

Sue shared the top reasons why people use social media. Some of these include the ability to stay in touch with friends, current events, a time waster, a place to look up funny and inspirational quotes, share photos and videos, meet new people, general business networking, and share details in our everyday life. trolling. Sue uses the trolling technique to find out everything about someone before she meets them, so when they meet up at a local business social function, she already feels that connection, that will help her land them as a client.

This idea would also work great in vetting out a prospective member to our Rotary Club. When there is an individual, you may think would be a great member the Club, finding out a bit more about them in advance, would help make that personal connection to them, even before they are invited to a meeting.

Since most Rotarians in our Club are business professionals and community leaders, Sue recommends Linked-in. She views it as a Chamber of Commerce for social media. On Linked-in you can set up personal and business profiles, as well as publish articles to become an expert in your field of work.

Facebook is the most popular social media app, and is very inexpensive in the way of advertising upcoming Club events or members' businesses. Twitter is great for keeping up with major news events and getting the word out on local emergencies with the use of hashtags (#).

A hashtag used to be called the pound sign on your phone (#), but now it is used to allow your content to be searchable over the Internet. For example, a lot of people just use hashtags for fun little sayings #NoBetterRotaryClubThanVictorville, some use it to promote an upcoming special event #winejazzmore2016, or even use it to post and search for updates on major events #sandfire.

YouTube can be used to find out how to do anything, Pinterest can help you find out what your spouse wants for Christmas, Instagram is perfect if your company is visual or a retail shop and the list goes on and on into the thousands of social media apps that are out there today.

The world has truly changed the way it communicates, and those not willing to adjust will be left behind. It's time to start thinking on how we can use social media to strengthen our Club for the next generation.
