The Games Pharmaceuticals Play

This week we heard from **Chris Bubser**, a biotechnology advisor who has built a career in healthcare, working with doctors, scientists, and business leaders to deliver lifesaving treatments to patients. After spending countless hours fighting insurance companies to try and get coverage for her daughter with epilepsy, Chris has been inspired to run for Congress. As someone who knows the healthcare system very well, plus the downsides not only medically but politically, she was on hand this week to discuss why prescription drug costs are so high.

Basic research and development goes into the making of prescription drugs, but it comes at a high price. The ones initially

paying the cost are investors, and many times in the billions of dollars. As well as investors, all prescription drugs need to have a patent attached to it that runs for 17 years. Once everything begins with testing and marketing, the patent clock starts ticking.

It normally takes about 10 years for the drug to come to market and then the investors only have 7 more years to make their investments back. This simply is one of the main reasons why

the costs are so high. Plus, depending on the severity of what the drug will treat, the cost could be enormous. According to commonwealthfund.org, "Conditions like multiple sclerosis and rheumatoid arthritis and cancer which are treated with what are called specialty drugs and biologics – they have the highestpriced medicine - often \$50,000 to \$100,000 per year, and some drugs for these conditions are priced in the \$300,000 to \$400,000 range for an annual treatment. But even drugs for common conditions like diabetes have been increasing astronomically and creating affordability issues for patients, because patients who are being treated

for diabetes take those medicines every day, so year over year increases are having an impact on their pocketbooks as well."

Once a patent runs out, other companies can then begin marketing generic versions, which makes it much more affordable to the consumer but it means less money for the pharmaceutical companies. They end up passing up the inventing of new, innovative drugs, and instead changing some molecules and just putting out a slightly different type of the same medicine, to extend the patent another 17 years.

Chris then shared some updates on COVID vaccines. There are 140 vaccines currently in development, with 16 being actively tested from all over the world. Sadly, as Americans we are paying more for drugs than anywhere else in the world, so once a vaccine is one the market, you can be pretty sure that the pharmaceutical game will continue...
