

ESCAPING TO LIVE AGAIN

The Family Assistance Program is one of those great non-profits that not only serve the ones in need, but family and loved ones themselves. This week were joined by **Vida Pazarin** and **Jobi Wood** who shared many of the programs that serve those looking for escape, and those looking to live again.



Since 1985, Family Assistance Program, formally known as High Desert Domestic Violence Program has been providing shelter and advocacy services to victims of domestic violence.

Throughout the years, the agency has grown into so much more. They now have a much larger shelter, a transitional housing program, a separate outreach office, satellite offices in the cities of San Bernardino and Fontana, and have embarked on several new programs: two runaway/homeless youth shelters, a homeless youth street outreach team , youth drop-in centers, Next Step re-entry program, community centers, antihuman trafficking program, and other programs and services to support the needs of our Victor Valley, San Bernardino, and Morongo Basin communities.

As the community needs have been identified, the agency has grown to accommodate and assist the population. They provide assistance with restraining orders, advocacy, homelessness, homeless prevention, rapid re-housing, preventative services

through teen violence classes, substance use disorder classes, family/ group/individual counseling, supervised visitation, and the distribution of household commodities are just some of the services provided to our community in need.

The Hope House is their leading service, providing

housing for victims of Domestic Violence. They serve more than just women, but also men who suffer from this violence, as well as their family members and even pets.

The Open Door lends support for victims of Human Trafficking. Although it is emotionally draining for staffers at times, it is highly rewarding. In 2022 they helped over 1,000 people though a variety of outreach programs.

The Next Step service provides the tools for re-entry housing and support plus Our House and My Place provide shelters for at-risk youth ages 11 - 17. They also have a special shelter for those from the LGBTQ community.

The Fam Spot is for those 18-24 years old and provides housing for homeless youth in the High Desert. The Drop in and housing comes with case managers, LGBTQ friendly and a positive experience to grow with people their own age. They are currently looking for sponsors to build a 14 home tiny village park, to give housing to these youth looking to prepare to re-enter society, with the right tools and determination.

It is their goal and continued effort to build stronger families through other services that do not necessarily pertain only to Domestic Violence. The Family Assistance Program is growing more diversified as the community develops and the needs are assessed. In turn, all these services have been offered in an effort to assist low-income families in creating safe and stable homes.
