Desert Community Bank has had a long rich history here in the High Desert. **Mike Johnson**, Rotarian and Senior Branch Manager of the main Victorville Branch spoke to the Club this week on the many aspects past, present and future of this iconic organization. Those who have made the High Desert their home for many years will always remember tag lines such as, "Community is Our Middle Name" and "More Ways to Say - YES!".



is managed by Rotarian **Chris Vasquez**. Next was Mike's branch Victorville Main, which has been newly remodeled, after the move from the Silica Road building into their old drive-thru location. Finally that same year, DCB made their debut in Wrightwood. The building used to be a deli and in fact the old freezer now serves as the bank vault. In 2005 they opened the Dunia Plaza location, but it has since closed. Finally, is the Phelan Branch.

DCB has been doing business since 1980 and in those early days they struggled. Although not the bank's first President, Rotarian **Ron Wilson** revitalized the bank during his tenure and they've never looked back from there. They have had nine branches in their history, with eight still doing business today.

Their first branch was actually a trailer on LaPaz Drive, and the Victorville North branch was built on the same location. The second location can be found in Barstow on Armory Road and the third one appeared in Apple Valley which is still doing business at 16003 Quantico Road. Mike made sure to let everyone know that they were there first at their next location in Adelanto. Now it sits in front of GEO Prison, and coming soon across the street will be a marijuana cultivation warehouse. They are looking for a new location. In 1996, they built three locations beginning with the Hesperia Branch, which

Then came the biggest change of all, the merger with East West Bank. The bank geared toward Asian clients chose to keep the name and oversaw the bank from 2007 through 2018. They specialized in specialty lending products like State Income Loans, where the customer just tells the bank how much they make and get a loan off of their income solely, basic banking, niche investment opportunities, plus they were very business minded.

From 2018 to today, the bank has been merged with Flagstar Bank. Mike feels that Flagstar is better suited for High Desert customers, with personal loans and better Home Equity Loans than previously. Flagstar has a robust mortgage product line with 80 different mortgage loan products. In fact, Flagstar is the 5th largest mortgage lending bank in the United States. In addition, this merger allowed DCB to be able to do almost any kind of investment and insurance coverage for their customers. Finally, Flagstar has always been a huge supporter of community involvement, as one can see from their many donations, giving back to the community through their work with area non-profits.

The future for Desert Community Bank looks even brighter. Coming soon the bank will merge with New York Community Bank. The merger was meant to take place this year, but due to Covid and delays from regulators, no date has been given when this will officially take place. With New York Community Bank having assets in the range of 56 million, this will help DCB become a stronger bank. They have 237 bank branches across

VVTA's efforts to aid in getting new clientele onto the public transit system has grown over the past few years, and they are constantly moving forward with new ideas to provide public transportation



opportunities for new and future consumers. The Fare Media Program is aimed at low-income, disabled, or seniors who currently lack transportation options, or are not familiar with the VVTA system, and therefore are not able to utilize it. VVTA was successful in securing funds, specifically aimed at these individuals, in order to help them learn to utilize the local transit system as well as to help subsidize the cost of their travel. It is their goal to utilize these funds to the maximum extent possible and serve as many individuals as is possible. Organizations that serve these communities, and these individuals, may apply on behalf of their clients for these funds. The selected organizations will be required to document that the clients that receive the scholarships meet the selection criteria, and report back to VVTA on these statistics.

We will continue next week with 7 dice and \$375 for the lucky Rotarian who picks the Blue Dice from the bag!


Fine Session
