He began to once again wonder what he was going to do. Luckily he got some great advice, to look at business survival in a different way. Long term planning should be 4 days in length and the short-term plan is today.

In the days that followed, the future of Greiner GM was only current until 12

noon, and once the decision to stay open made it past noon, then it was only current until 5 pm, when the staff would meet to discuss the plan through noon the following day.

On March 19, Governor Newsom declared the Stay at Home Order, and deemed the different types of business that were "essential" and "non-essential". Due to the fact they, Greiner, work on cars, as well as sells them, were deemed essential.

To add to the situation, many of his competitors chose to shut down, which made David question if he was making the right decision. He had no assurance if customers would show up but stayed the course and remained open. He soon realized there were two types of people affected by Coronavirus; those who stayed at home and those who went out purposely to spend money!

On March 29th, the Federal Cares Act allowed those on unemployment as well as independent contractors who have been affected by COVID-19 an additional \$600 a week tax free, and with travel plans canceled and places

like Disneyland closing, left people with a lot of extra money. Consumers who had been putting fixing their cars on hold plus those who had been thinking about buying a new vehicle, passed through the doors of Greiner GM. This created a perfect scenario for them, as they were one of the only full-service dealerships in town, their sales went through the roof!

With all of this going on, David had to walk a fine line, selling to those who came in the dealership, but acknowledge those who were scared of the pandemic. The company handled this by delivering and picking up vehicles to homes, plus enhanced cleaning throughout the dealership and cars. All of this amazed David, as earlier in the month, he thought why would anyone want to buy a car during a pandemic, but it didn't end.

On June 18th the Mask Mandate was made official, and David thought Greiner was finally done with customers coming through,

I was honored to fill in for our President this week and want to thank Dave Greiner for his extremely interesting talk on how COVID affected his business in the most remarkable way!




As a reminder, it is very important for you to attend our September 1st meeting as we will have a Club Assembly to select our succession of Rotary Club Presidents for the next couple of years.

but they sold 5 cars that day alone! From that day forward, more and more keep buying which has now in part led to a huge shortage of available vehicles on the market.

Back in April, GM chose to shut down making new cars and focused on making Ventilators, and with the continuing sales that no one expected, has led to an average two-week shortage on cars. Right now, there are very few cars on Greiner's lot, and all truck lines are sold out. Customers can go in, order their car, submit their trade-in vehicle and while they wait for their new car, David loans them back their trade-in while the customer starts making payments on their car they don't even have yet!

David concluded his talk sharing the two perspectives he has learned for businesses through this pandemic, you can plan and stay in business for a short time, or not plan and feel your way through to success.
