The Mojave Water Agency is basically a water wholesaler who provides water to retailers such as our local cities and water companies through the use of both imported and

Finemaster: Ryan McEachron time of growth and the State Water Project, that worked along side with the Central Valley Water Project in terms of water rights for the state. In the area of permitted water rights, the California Department of Water Resources (State of California - SWP) has rights to about 30 million acre feet while the U.S. Bureau of Reclamation (Federal Government - CVWP) has rights to a whopping 110 million acre feet!

Today we are learning to live within our means in terms of water. While Californians had saved a lot of water due to great work with water conservation, there is a decreasing reliability with groundwater depletion in California's Central Valley.

Counteracting this the Mojave Water Agency and others are working to make sure there is plenty of water for generations to come. One way is through local projects like Regional Recharge and Recover Projects, and Stormwater Recharge, to use rain water to be reused for our sustainability. More flexibility is needed like groundwater storage programs and a more diverse portfolio using not only rain water but ocean water as well as other sources. The final area is more cooperation with the proposed future of the California Water Fix project and the continuing evolution with reclamation and recycled water. The working relationship between the State and Federal Governments is very complicated, but they try very hard to work together with environmental and contractor issues on all levels.
