There are many needs for people in the High Desert and within the area of medicine, the lack of care is by far the most important need in the community. This information was presented by Providence St. Mary Executive Director Operations, Kozyra, who told the Club other important issues for residents are mental health, homelessness, and obesity/ diabetes prevention.

Currently there is staggering shortage

doctors throughout the country. The US Council on Graduate Medical Education states that for good care, there should be 60 to 80 primary care physicians for every 100,000 people. Statewide the number has gone down to 50 and in Apple Valley & the High Desert, the number is only 35 primary care experts for every 100,000 people.

High Desert and recruiting talented retaining physicians with a residency program.

A study on Providence Milwaukie Hospital in Oregon has demonstrated that a residency program enhances recruitment and retention for rural hospitals. Results from the study concluded that approximately 90% of the graduates practice with 50 miles of their residency. Most of the graduates stay within 15 miles of their training and

choose to continue to provide care to the under-served.

Creation of the residency program is going to be a four year process. 2022 was the Planning Phase. They retained expert Graduate Medical Education consultants to perform a feasibility study and assist with a three-year plan and budget, that has been completed. The Rauch Family Foundation donated 2.1 million in funding for the residency program.

This year is the Building Phase. They have started developing the overall residency program infrastructure, including the residency program application, recruiting a director, upgrading facilities and planning for a Simulation Lab.

In 2024, they will complete the Launching Phase. During this time they will build the medical residency program, including hiring a program coordinator, start build-out of the Simulation Lab and begin marketing to recruit students.

Finally, in 2025 will be the Growing Phase. Providence St. Mary will launch the residency with six students to begin with. The program will grow to allow up to 18 students and the goal is for 2 or more per year to begin practice in the High Desert.

Providence St. Mary's outlook to solve the lack of care problem is innovative and a wonderful outlook on the future of medical practice in the High Desert.
