

JOURNALISM HASN'T CHANGED, BUT THE DELIVERY HAS

Imagine a company cutting staff by nearly 90% and still expecting it to function at the same level. That would be quite the challenge, but that's what has happened to the Victorville Daily Press.

Back in 2010, the newspaper had more than 15 reporters, and a full staff that printed a daily paper in Victorville. Today, the paper is printed in Phoenix, Arizona, with an early deadline.

In August, the Daily Press was whittled down to one sports

reporter, one investigative reporter covering Barstow, and one reporter, **Rene Ray De La Cruz**, who covers the entire High Desert.

Rene shared with the Club this week how the paper runs at this point and what may lie in the future.

The iconic Daily Press building was sold years ago, and they now lease it, while most staff work from home.

The Daily Press is overseen remotely by Desert Sun Executive Editor **Julie Makinen** out of Palm Springs and **James Ward**, the editor of the Visalia Times Delta.

What stories does Rene, the sole news reporter, cover? He said the "bigger stories" like elections, infrastructure projects, some council agenda items, new housing tracts and new businesses. When time allows, smaller community stories will get covered.

Rene's family moved from Texas to the High Desert just after 1900. His dad was born in Victorville in 1924 and Rene was born in Apple Valley in 1961.

Because of his connection to the High Desert, he feels an obligation

to fill the newspaper and website with as many community-based stories as possible.

Rene praised his bosses, Makinen and Ward, for their hard work and support of those working at the Daily Press.

He also credited organizations like the San Bernardino County Sheriff's Department, City of Victorville, and Victor Valley Transit for their timely responses to questions when covering stories. Despite print media's decline, Daily Press print subscribers are very loyal, he said.

Digital Media is the new form of getting news, and in 2020 total online Daily Press stories had been clicked and read over 15.1 million times.

What is the future of the Daily Press? Nobody really knows at this point. In the past, there was talk of moving the paper to a twice weekly schedule. Rene said his passion and calling is to be a journalist.

So no matter what the future holds, he'll continue to write...
