

Millions of these refugees have found safety in Turkey (2 million), Lebanon (1.1milion), Jordan (700,000), Egypt (150,000). European countries have struggled to resettle hundreds of thousands of these refugees: Greece, Germany, Sweden, Bulgaria, Netherlands, France, Denmark and Hungary. The U.S. has accepted 1,500 Syrian refugees and international pressure is building to get the United States to accept more Syrian refuges.

What role should we take? We already give the largest amount in aide financially. Dr. Mariam firmly believes that the United States has a moral obligation to help. He feels Ronald Regan's statement on United States Immigration and Refugee Policy from July 1981, will work today, not only for Syrian Refugees, but for Immigration as well. The United States is a country formed on immigration. Even though we should not encourage illegal immigration, we need to recognize that both the U.S. and Mexico have both historically benefited from Hispanics obtaining employment in the U.S. and those wishing to become productive members on our country should be recognized and accorded legal status.

Dr. Mariam states that the United States should lead the world on International acceptance of the Syrian Refugees. One country cannot do it all, but if the United States does not shoulder some of the responsibility, we cannot expect that other countries will either.

From Ronald Regan, "We recognize that immigration and refugee problems require international solutions. We will seek greater international cooperation in the resettlement of refugees and, international cooperation to assist accelerated economic development to reduce motivations for illegal immigration."
