#### The Genesis of Hesperia 1840 - 1900

If there is one thing Griz knows everything about, it's

Hesperia. As Foundation Director of the Hesperia Area Recreation District Foundation and curator of the Hesperia Old Town Museum, Gary "Griz" Drylie has amassed quite a collection and knowledge of all things Hesperia, and was on hand this week to share, what is touted as part 1 of a 3 part speaking trilogy, beginning with its first 60 years, from 1840 -1900. Dressed in 1840s period clothing, Griz shared some of his incredible knowledge with the Club.

In the 1840's, before the area was known as Hesperia,

Kit Carson and General Freemont first explored the area while traveling West along the Mojave Trail. From there, Silas Cox was a fur trapper in the area, and known as a modern

day Daniel Boone. A story shared was that once some horse

thieves stole his horse named "Chappo" and he went on the hunt to find it. Once found, he not only took his horse back but set all the other horses free so the thieves couldn't chase after him! This happened in Summit Valley, which is sometimes referred to as "Horse Thief Canyon & Little Horse Thief Canyon". The stories just continued from there.

The founding of Hesperia truly began in the 1860's with the Widney brothers, Robert Maclay Widney and Joseph Palmaroy Widney, who were early entrepreneurs. Coming out of Ohio, they saw the new railroad being

built across country, the and had the foresight to buy up water rights and land before



the railroad companies came through. By the

time they got to the High Desert in 1885. They purchased the land and founded what is now known as Hesperia. Side note. both brothers are also known as the founders of USC.

Jumping back a bit, Griz shared about the John Brown Toll Road in 1860. John Brown received a government contract to build & operate a toll road up the Cajon Pass, through the High Desert and beyond. After the first 18 months of back breaking

work, Mother Nature destroyed it all in one storm. This was no ordinary storm; a torrential 4 day storm that dumped 50" of rain and created four 4ft. lakes in the area. The toll road was gone, and work had to begin again from scratch.

Griz also spoke about the first Hesperia Schoolhouse and the old Hesperia



Hotel. The original School House was built in 1883 with fired red brick that were brought to Colton from Los Angeles via railroad car and then transported up the John Brown trail to Hesperia by freight wagons. The Railroad arrived in the area that became known as Hesperia in 1885. The Hesperia

hotel was three stories tall, or four if you count the basement which is where the kitchen was housed. It took 2.5 years to be built and was made with sun dried adobe clay bricks, but painted red to protect the adobe.

Griz has many unique and wonderful items at the Hesperia Rec. & Parks Harrison Exhibit Center that houses The Hesperia Old Town Museum collection and the John Swisher/McGinnis Collection. There are artifacts such as blueprints for Hesperia railroad stations, plus bricks and hardware from the old schoolhouse and hotel and much more. Currently closed due to the pandemic, once back opened you can learn more about Hesperia by visiting the Museum at 16367 Main St. in Hesperia. Until the next chapter Griz!
