#### WATER FOR FUTURE GENERATIONS

After 27 years in water, **Kathy Cortner**, General Manager for the Mojave Water Agency, is an expert in the field of water rights and usage. Kathy spoke to the Club this week on the sustainability, growth and challenges of preserving water for future generations.

The MWA was formed in 1960 after bring voted into being by the community to be a voice in water rights and future economic development. The agency covers

areas to the north of Newberry Springs and as far south as 29 Palms. The Mojave Water Agency is one of twenty-nine State Water Agencies who are contracted to draw water from the Delta.

The Agency draws water from a variety of sources including snow-melt from the San Bernardino Mountains, local storm flows, wastewater imports from outside the area, and return flow from non-used pump water. The latter part is water recharged back into their basins.

While The Mojave River and California Aqueduct are used to store water into basins. When not in drought we draw water from the Delta.

This allows MWA to save water for allocation for the future, and put water in different 15 recharge sites throughout their region.

They also have to be alert of the consequences of the water laws. SB211 affects projects of 500 dwelling units unless sufficient water supply is or will be available prior to completion of the project. In addition, SB610 states water supply assessment demonstrates available supplies for residential with 500 dwelling units, retail with

500,000 square feet of floor space, commercial with 250,000 square feet of floor space or industrial with 650,000 square feet of floor space or housing 1,000 persons.

One of the biggest challenges is illegal pumping, which is any unauthorized pumping that creates an imbalance in the water supply. The greatest threat is the growth of illegal cannabis operations. These operations threaten not only water supply, but also water quality, wildlife and the overall quality of life.

There are also the environmental impacts. Continued droughts, as well as climate change, rising sea levels and new environmental laws threaten the ability to save water.

Along with continued campaigns to promote conservation, the MWA has invested in supplemental water to augment our local water supply, are ready for a drought, are currently pretty drought proof and have the ability to sustain the High Desert to grow, not only now, but long into the future. Thank you MWA for the great job, providing water for future generations in the High Desert!
