The United Kingdom's decision by the voters to leave the European Union has been guite the story over the last few months, and here at home, a lot of people are wondering what will be it's impact here in the States. Rotarian David North from Desert Community Bank, helped us all understand this week exactly what it is and some financial changes we will see.

political alliance. This political understanding led the way for the use of the euro (the currency used in 19 EU countries) and permits citizens in the EU to travel and settle across borders without a passport. The EU even employs its own parliament and makes decisions regarding things like trade, transportation, and environmental policy.

The EU allows the countries within it to function largely as a single entity. It was initially put in place to allow for the free movement of people, goods, and money under what it termed a "single market."

I asked a friend of mine from Wolverhampton, UK where his vote went on Brexit. "I am in favor of it", he said, "Europe has too many unelected officials. I believe countries should be self-governing, yet looking out for each other. The union has gone to five and that's what the British people voted for."

Financially, the UK never moved to the euro, the currency of the EU, so they are in a perfect spot to exit. The UK never left using the pound, there is no issue developing a new currency. On the downside The British pound will buy fewer euros or dollars. Spending will be a significant negative impact as the pound is expected to stay 10% below where it was prior to the Brexit vote. If that is true, imported goods will get more expensive – which means food, clothing and household are all likely to get pricier.

The UK is still subject to the laws of the EU until Britain's exit becomes legal. In order for the UK to make its break official, the country needs to invoke Article 50. It is unclear exactly what this process will entail or how long it will take as Britain is the first country to take its leave of the EU. Once Article 50 has been formally invoked, the UK has two years to negotiate its departure with the other member states.
