THE BENEFITS OF BEING A RED CROSS VOLUNTEER

The Rotary Club of Victorville had the pleasure this week by hearing from **Erin Fox**, the Disaster Program Director and Raul Diaz, the Regional Program Director for the American Red Cross.

The mission of the American Red Cross is to prevent and alleviate human suffering in the face of emergencies by mobilizing the power of volunteers and the generosity of donors. In fact, 95% of the Red Cross is made up of strictly volunteer positions.



2020 was a record year for the American Red Cross. Not only did they have to deal with the Covid-19 Pandemic, but also 17 wildfires, and 6 additional large scale evacuations! This lead to over 204,000 people evacuated, 71 hotels booked, over 31,000 snacks given out, and 29,568 meals served. It takes a lot of man power to handle the logistics in an emergency, but many more are needed to fill the needs of the Southern California community.

Currently volunteers are urgently needed many positions such as an Disaster Action Team volunteer. A DAT volunteer provides 24hour immediate emergency response to local disasters, particular house fires, ensuring that those affected have access to resources

Fine Master: Ryan McEachron for basic needs such as food, shelter and clothing.

Other areas of volunteer needs include: Mass Care, which provide services such as feeding, sheltering, reunifications and distribution of emergency supplies; Logistics, providing vehicle tracking, acquisition of materials, facilities and warehousing; Recovery, conducting client interviews, providing clients with information and

referrals to community partners for additional assistance; and Disaster Services Technology, which provides support in the use of computers printers, IT equipment, plus radios, and antennas in regards to disaster relief.

After Erin spoke, Raul **Diaz** shared the ARC Service to the Armed Forces division. Volunteers and staff help facilitate communication from family members to service members when emergency arises, and assist where



needed. They also help build brave family members with courses and workshops such as "How to Deal with Deployment", as just one example. Their volunteers lend support not just to service members and their families, but military hospitals, and more.
