Exposing the Myths of Reverse Mortgages

First to clear up some common misconceptions. Most people assume with a reverse mortgage you lose ownership of your home. This is not true. The reverse mortgage is repaid when the borrower dies, permanently moves from the residence, or the property is sold. Instead of you paying the bank monthly and the equity in your home growing, the bank pays you monthly, and the equity may shrink.

Others think that there are restrictions on how you can use your money from a reverse mortgage, and that is another falsehood. This is an FHA insured loan and people use this money for a wide variety of reasons from upgrading their lifestyles, building a business, or to provide security or education to their children or grandchildren.

There is another myth out there about reverse mortgages that is only partly true. While yes you could wind up owing more on your house than it is worth, you will not leave your heirs with debt, as the bank takes possession of the house once the last person on the mortgage passes. If you are planning to leave your home to your family, then this is not for you.

People tend to shy away from reverse mortgages, thinking they are too complicated, but Shannon assured us that, in fact, this process is very simple. It is basically a loan... just backwards.

For these people, in most cases, their homes are paid off and allows them to fill their portfolio gaps when the market is down and once it improves, then they continue withdrawing from their portfolio.
