HOW TO VOTE DURING A PANDEMIC...

In a much different sort of presentation, this week's Rotary meeting was held at **Don Lager's** Midway Home Solutions, by **Robert Chevez** and **Melissa Eickman** from the San Bernardino County Registrar of Voters via Zoom as is their protocol due to the Covid-19 Pandemic. They were on hand to share the new election process for

San Bernardino County voters.

One of the newest changes is that unlike the past, ALL County residents will receive a mail-in ballot instead of just those who have opted for an Absentee Ballot as in former elections. This is planned only for this election due to Coronavirus, but unlike the thoughts of our President during the first debate, the Registrar of Voters showed that this a completely safe way to vote.

In previous elections, 70% of voters in the County voted "Absentee," so adding another 30% will be no issue to the staff on hand to make sure all ballots are collected and counted. There

is a voting box for every 15,000 voters to drop off your ballot if you don't feel comfortable sending it in the mail either. There are 70 Voter Boxes currently in the county and the slot is only wide enough to put an envelope in, so no harm can come to your ballot. Boxes are open now and will stay open to collect ballots until

8:00pm on November 3rd. These voter boxes are locked and bolted to concrete from the inside, preventing anyone from stealing them. The bolts are on the inside and workers need to get through a couple areas of security to even get to the bolts. The boxes will be emptied every 96 hours over the first few weeks, and as we get closer to the election, every 48 hours. A map of voter boxes can be found at www.SBCountyElections. com. Once you mail or drop off your ballot, you can get tracking updates via text, email or recorded voice mail of when your ballot has been mailed, received and counted by using the Secretary of State's "Where's My Ballot" tracking system at WheresMyBallot.sos.ca.gov.

Also coming in your mail box are two Voter Information Guides. The first one will contain a sample ballot, candidate statements and local measure information while the second is a supplemental guide, and only contains information for measures J and K. Sending these separately saves taxpayers \$300,000.



For those who still want to vote in person, voting sites are being set up with a radius of one polling place per 10,000 residents. Within the next week there will be six early voting sites, and currently one is available at the County Registrar of Voters. Another five locations will be open during the last week of October and two of them are in the High Desert. One is at Hook Community Center in Victorville and the other is at the Town of Apple Valley Recreational Center. The remaining are at Joshua Tree Community Center, Toyota Arena in Ontario and at the San Bernardino International Airport Domestic Terminal. No matter where you live in the county, you can go to any of these early sites.

Closer to Election day, the remaining polling places will be available for a 4-day period from October 31 through November 3rd. There will be 210 polling places, which is double the number required. Unlike the early voting sites, your designated polling place is listed on the back of your mail-in ballot. If you choose to not go to your designated polling place, then you may have a long wait as you will need to vote via a tablet and there are only three available per site. Poll workers will be provided with face masks, face shields, gloves, hand sanitizer and cleaning supplies. High-touch surfaces will be cleaned throughout the day, and if a mandatory face covering is required, they will have some on hand for those who don't bring one.

Once you place your ballot, stronger cybersecurity measures have been implemented and the system is being continually evaluated and upgraded during the coming weeks. Poll workers also trained to deescalate situations and coordinate with Sheriff and Police Offers who will be nearby and ready for any situation that may need their involvement. No law enforcement will be at polling sites, as that could be ultimately viewed as voter intimidation.

The Registrar of Voters are trying to get the word out that every vote does count and matters. They are also encouraging residents to vote as early as possible. Jobs are also available for election workers in full time positions throughout the County at \$15.96 per hour. For more information please visit www.SBCountyElections.com.
