

# **No Water = No Economic Growth**

Rotarians this week got a chance to hear from author Jeff Crider on the history of water in the High Desert, and what a tale it was! Jeff is public relations consultant and writer with nearly 20 years of experience providing strategic media relations counsel and specialized writing services for water agencies across Riverside and San Bernardino counties.

A former Desert Sun and Press-Enterprise reporter, Jeff recently wrote a 105-page history book titled "Delivering the Future: 60 Years of Vision and Innovation at San Bernardino Valley Municipal Water District", which is now available in several public and university libraries across

Southern California.

He is currently developing a history book for Mojave Water Agency, which explores controversies involving the adjudication of high desert water rights, the impact of the State

### This Week's Functionaries

Invocation: Flag Salute: 4-Way Test: Song: Van Young Brad Letner Marie Langley Al Castellucci 1960 for the specific purpose of bringing supplemental water into communities that would otherwise run out of water if they relied solely on surface and groundwater supplies. MWA also manages surface and groundwater supplies throughout its 5,000 square mile area to ensure that the High Desert region doesn't run out of water.

Water interests in Los Angeles and Orange Counties posed similar threats to the future development of the High Desert in the 1920's and 30's when they tried to divert the waters of the Mojave River for themselves.

One such effort involved the city of Pasadena, which filed a claim with the State Water Commission for "the entire run-off of the Mojave River watershed, including all waters not now used by riparian owners," according to a Jan. 25, 1921 article in the San Bernardino County Sun. Pasadena's plan was to store water at the Fork's reservoir site and to direct the water through a 10-mile-long tunnel down the mountain to Devil Canyon and then westward through a conduit line that would run along the foot of the San Gabriel Mountains to Pasadena.

High Desert landowners fight finally stopped Pasadena from taking our water. In years continuing other cities tried the same thing including, San Bernardino, Riverside and even Orange Country, just to keep watering their orange groves!

By the late 1950's, concerns about the inability of High Desert groundwater supplies to meet future demands led lawmakers to create the Mojave Water Agency for the specific purpose of importing water from Northern California to make up for anticipated shortfalls in local supplies as the region continued to grow. Without our much needed water, there would have been no economic growth in the High Desert, and it would not be what it is today.
