

SPEAKING UP FOR CHANGE!

For over 50 years **Jim Cox** has been Apple Valley Town Manager for Apple Valley, Victorville City Manager, and is recognized as the longest serving Council Member in the State of California for his tenure with the City of Victorville. Jim spoke this week and addressed some questions Rotarians had for him.

One question raised was about the growing housing tracts in the High Desert. Jim enlightened everyone by

are moving here and commuting to work, which is causing chaos on the 15 Freeway.

Speaking of traffic, another question raised had to deal with red light cameras. The reason they are no longer used was strictly political. The major issue was that the fines were so steep even judges were embarrassingly reducing the fines when in court. The problem was that the public thought the City of Victorville was raking in the

money from all the hefty fines and getting rich off of them, but in reality, the fines were set by the California Legislature and the City only received \$32 per citation. But the public wouldn't listen, and they took them down. With the City receiving \$18 million annually, the issue is now being addressed and the money will be used to hire many more officers. Citations will now be around \$450 for running red lights, and with more officers, more tickets will be written up.

As for the topic of illegal dumping, there is a three-tier fine system. \$100 for the first offence, \$250 for the second and \$500 for the third. Jim supported that half of the fine money should go to the person reporting the crime, and it was one of the most unpopular ideas he ever had with the public. The thought of children turning in their parents in or spouse turning in the other spouse proved to be too much.

Other topics addressed during the meeting included the city and schools working together, voting districts and the homelessness problem. As discussed before, if someone steals \$950 or less in a

robbery, it is a misdemeanor. Because of that, it is the highest reported crime in the High Desert. Many of the people committing these crimes do it to pay for their drug addictions and become homeless because their family doesn't want them back anymore. Currently, the city is looking into options, such as they are doing in Boise, Idaho. The punishment there is very strict and is driving the homeless away. One such example is urinating in public equals jail time, not a ticket, as it currently stands in California.

Finally, Jim shared there is only one way that changes can happen is to make sure the city hears from you! Send emails, make phone calls, and speak at Council Meetings. Speaking up and sharing your thoughts can and will bring the changes we need in Victorville.

Fine Session

Jon Hove was a "special guest" Fine Master this week and chose five Rotarians to share something that happened in their business over the past week and accept a fine for sharing. The largest fine of \$100 was awarded to Mike Page for sharing that due to the vaccine mandate for Providence St. Mary, many hospital staff got vaccinated or exemptions, and in the end they did not have to close beds, as that was a big concern for them. Fire Chief Jeff Armstrong shared that over the last week things caught on fire, and they put them out. Then more stuff caught on fire. And again they put them out. Cars crashed, and some caught on fire. And they put those out. Jeff received a \$5 fine. Brad Poiriez dealt with a lot of dust in the air at MDAQMD but shared he cannot control Acts of God. Instead he had to deal with a \$10 fine.

Bill Edwards was happy to take a fine of \$20 for announcing their first Women's Shelter that will open on November 1st! Finally, **Kevin Kane** paid a fine of \$25 for sharing a Victor Valley Transit passenger complaint that a Driver would not leave their bus to go into the Lucerne Valley Post Office to get the passenger's mail for them!
