It was there, in the height of WWI, that the idea of, "wouldn't it be nice if we could do more to help others" became a reality, and now that idealism could finally spell the end of Polio forever.

Polio is almost at an end. That statement has been made for a few years now, but it is now looking like it will finally come true. What has been left of the Polio epidemic over the last few years were areas in Taliban control. Immunization workers went there to vaccinate the children, but the Taliban saw it differently. They were convinced that we were there to poison their children. This was not helped by the fact that there were some CIA operatives in the group trying to do just that! As one can imagine all workers were killed, and no one else dared venture in there again. When the Taliban fell, many people went to places like Syria, and sadly, carried Polio to those regions and it started to spread again. Last year the new regime was convinced that we are only there to help the children and now have "safe passage" to get the Polio Immunization into these countries and finally eliminate it 100%!

D.G. Luciano de Sylva has his own goals within the district this year, and that focus is on expanding the youth programs within Rotary. He would like to expand the Interact programs for middle and high school students and actually create an Interact District Council which will provide more opportunities for leadership, community service and a general improvement in their lives. There are also plans to expand the RYLA Program, as well as speech competition and Stover Music program. District Governor de Sylva wants our Club to continue to work in a positive way with youth. Finally, after a review of our Club, the report is that we are doing great!
