## A JOURNEY ACROSS THE THIN ICE

Due to the scheduled speaker canceling his appearance with 2 hours until the meeting, Joshua Tree Editor Chris Ackerman volunteered to share his testimony for the first time publicly....

Many people suffer from addictions. For some it's drugs, pornography, or alcohol, but for me it was what I like to call "Popularism". Since I was child, I have been seeking my place to be someone special and popular, and it was a journey that nearly destroyed me. Back in my younger days, I was the one who was not overly smart or athletic, but skinny, scrawny and always picked last for the team and left behind. Going into my

teenage years, (1979-1985) I went the other way, as a metal head stoner and all the trouble and mischievous that goes along with that. I found a passionate love for music and got lost in that.

In fear of what I was becoming, my mom read an article about a Christian Heavy Metal band called Stryper and bought me their first cassette. I ended up seeing them opening up a show at a club, even though I didn't believe in God, I respected them standing up for their faith, which led me to a youth group and in December 1985, I accepted Christ as my savior.

I thought I had finally become someone of substance and importance, but was soon to realized my Christian walk was akin

to walking across a lake of thin ice, and at any time something bad happened, the cracks would begin to emerge and so would my faith. My desire was more focused on having an identity over a deeper relationship with Jesus, and I soon learned that when I attended a conservative Bible College in Santa Cruz. Most of the students there were pastor's kids or missionary's kids, and quoting the Dean, "We've never had anyone like you here before, so we are going to let you in, but you have to be on probation from

day one." As a long-haired metal head Christian, it wasn't just the staff that didn't know what to do with me, but the students as well. Once again, I was back to my childhood, walking around the campus alone on Saturday nights, while most students were all in town, developing lifelong memories. After 2 years of this, I packed a few things and just drove away, never to return.

Back in Los Angeles, I found my purpose (or so I thought), I became the Lead Singer (Screamer) of a Christian Thrash Metal band, called Betrayal. We were signed to Wonderland Records, released two albums, "Renaissance by Death" and "The Passing". Once again the thin ice emerged. On the surface all looked good, behind the scenes, I was severely depressed, being taken advantage of, and doing things a front man of a Christian band should not be doing. Looking back now, my joy came from on performing on stage, signing autographs, and being recognized at other Christian metal shows.

In May of 1993, the unthinkable happened. On our way to Texas to play 3 sold out shows, the axle broke on our equipment trailer and the accident caused a father and 28-year-old son to hit our *Continued on page 2*

tire, flip multiple times and end the life of one and a paraplegic for the other. Imagine being a 21-year-old, alone at 2:00am in the darkness of the Arizona desert standing over a dead body and severely injured person. The thin ice finally broke, and I fell through completely, as well as my faith. It didn't take much longer till the band officially broke up, never to be seen from again. I was alone again.

I cut off my hair, went to College, studying Graphic Design became a business professional, which seemed to work. A few years later I became a sports announcer and that worked as well, and my desire to be popular began to devour me. Jesus teaches that our priorities in life are to be God, spouse, children, and then all the rest. My life priorities became "Crazy Chris" (*my sports announcer persona*), and everything else underneath. I spent countless hours at Chamber functions, mixers, events, motorcycle races I wasn't announcing at, wine tastings (which I didn't even drink), all to be seen and be recognized. My drive for popularity became a drug that gave me my self-worth, and it could never be satisfied. All I wanted to do was be a full-time professional sports announcer and every time I would hit a dead end; I would be livid. I wanted to be what I called an "A-List High Desert Business Celebrity" and whenever someone newer came in and took my spot, I would end up in a jealous rage. I was posting constantly on Facebook and always checking back to see how many "Likes" the post received. My kids used to say every time we went out, "Time to play the game on how many people recognize dad." It had taken control of my life, while God and family took more of a backseat.

In 2017, the ice started to crack again. You remember my love for music I mentioned earlier? A Christian artist I love named Neal Morse released a rock album, "The Similitude of a Dream" that was the story, "The Pilgrim's Progress", set to music. On this album there is a song, entitled "So Far Gone", (*you can find it on YouTube*) that shook me to my core. It felt like the song was written about and directly to me. This album made me begin to evaluate my life in a way I had never done beofre.

The ice finally broke wide in October 2018. My marriage was ending, and I was more the father of my kids than their dad. An incident happened that caused me to not only fall through the ice, but have a glacier fall on top of me for good measure. All I could feel was hopelessness and utter despair. My Brother-in-Law Curtis in Tennessee sent me a text that said, "God is going to show you how real He is through this situation", and long

Just like the character "Christian" in Pilgrim's Progress, I ended up at a fork in the road, where one way kept me on the path I had been living, and the other, forgiveness. I chose the latter path and almost immediately all the years of anger, hate, egotism, and jealousy instantly melted away...

Today in 2020, my life is now much different. I have a wonderful relationship with my children, teach Sunday School at my church, and thanks to God's grace I left a bad job situation and was blessed at a job where I now flourish as Marketing Manager/PIO for Victor Valley Transit. Not only do I look forward to going to work each day, love the staff, but it has allowed me to put my side company Signify Designs, almost to bed, and come home and be a husband and father. I am rarely on social media anymore and have left the Business Mixer life behind. I will never be perfect, and I still struggle with the desire for "Popularism" from time to time, but I surround myself with a small circle of Christian business leaders who keep me grounded. I have a real, mature relationship with God, instead of my past, which was all surface, no feeling.

Finally, when I am announcing sporting events now as "Crazy Chris", I do an invocation, and I finish each one with the same words I received two years ago, "If you are heartbroken, in pain, in addiction, anger, depression or can't look at yourself in the mirror, then ask God show you how real He is in ways you cannot imagine."
