Behind the Fence at SCLA

If you Google "Southern California Logistics Airport", you will see a lot of the same word used in conjunction with the old George Air Force Base; that word is "Bone Yard." After Rotarians heard from City of Victorville's **Sophie Smith** on what really happens behind the restrictive fence at SCLA, no one will think of that term again.

Sophie and her staff have a very specific role to market the airport in the region and attract new business for the aviation side. A partnership with Stirling Development, has opened the door for other type of industrial businesses in the area. Some of the great tenants they have are General Electric (GE) and Boeing. Both of these

companies use SCLA for flight testing operations. The reason why the airport is so attractive to them is because the location is restrictive air space for commercial airlines, so they can do unlimited testings in the air without concern of being in a plane's flight path. Known to our Club and in the community, ComAV use their facility for asset management. With over 240 acres to work with, they use their space to store and maintain aircraft until they are called out in the field. Another large company is Industrial Aerospace Coating (IAC), who use SCLA to paint aircrafts.

Businesses are not the only ones using the airport. The Federal Bureau of Prisons use the airport to transport prisoners to other facilities around the country, and our military use the area as a secondary landing strip for UAV's, which we all know as Drones.

Education is a big component at SCLA as well. Partnering with VVC, the Airframe and Power Plant School contains a lab and classroom, educating students for their FAA certification, for a career in aircraft maintenance. First responders such as Police, Fire and SWAT, use the old housing barracks for training drills.

Finally, the world of entertainment is a huge factor for the airport. Behind the scenes commercials, music videos and movies are shot with some of Hollywood's biggest stars, while the rest of the High Desert remains unaware. Southwest Airlines, Oceans 11, Fast and Furious, and Rhianna are just some of the productions filmed at SCLA.
