An Update from the VVWRA

The Victor Valley Wastewater Reclamation Authority (VVWRA) is working diligently with the local Cities, Town and the County to help bolster and improve the water resource management practices in our region. **Darron Poulsen**, VVWRA General Manager, provided an update on several projects that aim to improve the availability of recycled water to the region for the purpose of recharging the underground aquifer and for irrigating golf courses and landscape features. Today, the VVWRA produces over 4 billion gallons of recycled water annually. That water is discharged directly to the Mojave River or put into percolation ponds for recharge. Only 3 million gallons, .001%, of the total recycled water produced is used by local agencies for irrigation purposes.

In cooperation with the Mojave Water Agency and our local communities, plans are being discussed to develop a One Water solution for the Mojave Basin. A One Water projects looks at all sources of water equally. Every water source inclusive of ground water, recycled water, storm water and imported state project water contribute to the overall health of the Mojave Basin water supply. Historically these sources of water were managed separately each with their own set of goals and vision as to how to mange them. A One Water Project looks to develop plans that include all the water sources, seeking to find overlap of projects where unified funding and regional needs analysis help develop more impactful projects. Darron provided an example of these types of projects by describing the need for more storm water recharge basins in the region. New climate conditions are brining less but larger rain events to our local area. These large rain events cause significant damage to roads and other infrastructure as these large flows follow their historical path to the Mojave River. To minimize this damage and to focus recharge in the local area large retention basins could be built to capture that water before it gets to the river and flows downstream for the benefit of other agencies. The One Water Concept would look to work together with these storm water management practices and would collaborate in building these recharge basins so that recycled water and imported state water project water could also be put into the same basins to increase the positive impact to local groundwater. Darron also shared information on Cadiz and Fenner Valley Water Company larger water resource project located in the remote part of the Mojave desert by the small town of Amboy. There is a large underground aquifer in this part of the desert that holds more water than Lake Mead and Lake Powel combined. The Cadiz company is looking to utilize the basin to safely extract water for use in our local area and also act as a water bank for other agencies that may want to move water into the Cadiz Aguifer from the Colorado River. VVWRA along with the Mojave Water Agency and other communities in the Mojave Desert are considering a future partnership with Cadiz to help construct a larger version of the One Water Project by adding an additional water source to the overall water portfolio currently available for the Mojave Basin. Cadiz has plans to construct new pipelines and recharge basins that could enhance the current One Water plans being developed by VVWRA. This new partner and the larger scope of a potential future project working with Cadiz could provide opportunities for additional funding sources and grants that could help lessen the financial contributions from our local agencies and make the projects more affordable.

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
