EATON FIRE: A CAREER FIRE FOR THE AGES

The Rotary Club of Victorville had the honor of hosting **Josh Sprague**, Battalion Chief with the City of Victorville Fire Department, as this week's guest speaker. With 29 years of experience in San Bernardino County, Sprague shared his harrowing firsthand account of battling the devastating Eaton Fire of 2025, one of the most intense fires of his career.

Fire response in California operates as a cooperative effort between northern and southern jurisdictions, following the

principle of "Neighbors Helping Neighbors." When a major fire breaks out, resources from various departments are mobilized to assist. On January 7th, Sprague served as a Strike Team Leader, overseeing five engines and crews from multiple area departments. Due to high wind warnings the night before, they were placed on alert in preparation for potential deployment.

Initially, the crews were scheduled to convene in Devore, but their orders shifted when the County Fire Chief redirected them to a wind-driven fire in Colton.

This fire, fueled by strong winds and encampments in the area, was swiftly handled. Following their response in Colton, the teams were stationed at a hotel in Rancho Cucamonga, awaiting further assignments.

As fires raged in Pacific Palisades and the Pasadena/ Altadena region, an urgent request for 200 engines came through. The Eaton Fire was escalating rapidly, and at last, Sprague's team received the call to respond. They were deployed to Altadena Drive and

Woodbury, arriving to a catastrophic scene—everything around them was ablaze.

Despite his extensive career fighting wind-driven fires, Sprague had never encountered destruction of this magnitude. Commercial structures, schools, car dealerships, and businesses were engulfed in flames. The team focused their efforts on saving residential areas, strategically positioning themselves at opposite ends of an alley that was itself on fire.

The conditions were brutal. The relentless wind forced firefighters to lie flat on rooftops for stability, as standing upright was impossible. Sprague fought fires for so many hours that his eyes swelled shut from exposure to sand, dirt, and smoke. By 4 a.m., the high winds intensified, causing the fire to spread further into Altadena, leaving devastation in its wake.

After 56 hours of continuous firefighting, the team finally received a break. However, their work was far from over—they returned to extinguish hot spots and secure

the area. The mental toll was significant. Adrenaline was replaced by the weight of loss, reports of missing individuals, and the discovery of human remains. To combat the emotional strain, Sprague encouraged his team to take breaks in Pasadena, where grateful residents expressed their heartfelt thanks. These moments of appreciation helped uplift the firefighters as they pressed on.

For nearly two weeks, the crews worked in grueling 24-hour shifts before the Eaton Fire was fully contained. Just as they prepared to return home, they were reassigned to another fire in Beaumont, extending their mission even further.

Every firefighter has what they call a "Career Fire"—one that will stay with them forever due to its sheer scale, intensity, and emotional impact. For Sprague and his team, the Eaton Fire will always be that defining moment. It was a test of endurance, skill, and resilience—one marked by adrenaline, exhaustion, heartbreak, and gratitude.

The Rotary Club of Victorville thanks Chief Sprague for his service and for sharing his powerful story. His courage and dedication, along with that of all first responders, remind us of the sacrifices made to protect lives and communities in the face of disaster.
