HOW TO PLAN A CITY IN DEVELOPMENT

Tor 36 years, **Jim Cox** served as the City Manager of Victorville, California, guiding the city through decades of growth, challenge, and transformation. His leadership helped turn a small desert community into a thriving city, and his reflections offer a rare, thoughtful glimpse into both Victorville's past and its ongoing journey.

Harvard taught that successful city development begins with careful, methodical planning.

"They taught you to plan first, then build," he said. "But cities don't work that way. Most of the time, you're planning while it's already happening."

His perspective was shaped not just by academics, but by history. During World War II, industrial manufacturing pulled workers from rural farms into the cities. After the war ended, many didn't return to farm life, but instead settled in the cities. Unfortunately, when factories shut down, many urban communities suffered—leading to



economic decline and, in many cases, the creation of ghettos. It was a lesson in how quickly a city's fortunes could change.

Victorville's own story began humbly, with early development centered on 7th Street and the surrounding areas known as Upper Tatum and Lower Tatum. These areas were named after Clyde Tatum, a local potato farmer who generously donated land to help grow the city. Thanks in part to his vision, downtown

Victorville began to thrive, especially following the establishment of George Air Force Base. Tatum had a simple dream—that people could grow up in Victorville and stay here to build their lives.

But as the years passed, growth brought change. When the 15 Freeway was built, it was originally routed around Victorville, not through it. Residents were upset when development began near Greentree, an area close to the freeway. Over time, as car travel became more central to daily life, people began moving closer to freeway access, and the downtown area started to decline.

One of the greatest challenges Victorville faced was the closure of George Air Force Base. It left a void in the city's economy and identity. But out of that loss came opportunity. The base was transformed into the Southern California Logistics Airport, now a major Continued on page 2

economic engine employing over 7,000 people in stable, well-paying jobs. "That's secure employment," Cox noted. "That's what makes a difference."

Throughout his time in public service, Cox remained committed to doing what was best for the residents of Victorville—even if it meant voting for projects he didn't personally support. "If it was good for the people of Victorville, I voted for it," he said.

He also reflected on how city leadership has changed over the years. In the past, City Council members were often neighbors, friends, or at least familiar faces. "Now the council is made up of strangers, newer to Victorville, making big decisions about its future." Still, the goal remains unchanged: to help Victorville grow and create better-paying jobs for its residents.

Cox believes that success in city planning doesn't come from raising taxes or simply increasing wages. Instead, it comes from strong partnerships with private enterprise and creating conditions for sustainable development.

His career leaves behind a powerful legacy—a city shaped by steady leadership, a commitment to community, and a deep understanding of what it takes to grow not just buildings and roads, but a place people are proud to call home.
