THE CHANGING REAL ESTATE CLIMATE

The California real estate market in 2024 is marked by significant legislative changes and broader national trends, as shared this week by Rotarian and Associate Broker **Bo Goulet** with Coldwell Banker Home Source and Mojave River Mortgage. As the state grapples with ongoing housing challenges, new laws like AB 2559 and SB 567 are poised to shape the landscape, alongside the influence of high mortgage rates, tight inventory, and evolving buyer behavior.



AB 2559, introduced by Assembly-member Chris Holden, seeks to address California's persistent housing shortage by streamlining the approval process for new housing developments. This legislation mandates that cities and counties expedite permits for qualifying housing projects, particularly those focused on affordability and located in residential zones.

The primary goal of AB 2559 is to reduce the time and costs associated with housing development, encouraging

more investment in new projects. By simplifying the approval process, the bill aims to increase the housing supply, addressing the state's ongoing crisis. However, local governments may face challenges in adapting quickly to these new requirements, balancing development with community interests.

Senator María Elena Durazo's SB 567 focuses on expanding tenant protections and rent stabilization. This bill builds on previous rent control measures, further limiting

how much landlords can increase rents annually and tightening regulations on evictions.

SB 567 is designed to provide relief for renters in a state where rent increases have far outpaced wage growth. Supporters argue that the bill will help stabilize the rental market and protect vulnerable tenants from unjust evictions. Critics, however, caution that stricter rent controls could discourage investment in rental properties, potentially exacerbating the housing shortage.

California's real estate market is also influenced by broader national trends. High mortgage rates, driven by the Federal Reserve's efforts to combat inflation, have made home financing more expensive. This has slowed home sales as potential buyers are either priced out or hesitant to take on higher mortgage costs.

Tight inventory remains a significant issue across the country. Many homeowners are reluctant to sell in the

current high-rate environment, leading to a scarcity of available homes. This limited supply has kept prices relatively high, even as demand cools.

These economic conditions have led to shifts in buyer behavior. Many potential buyers are choosing to wait, hoping for a drop in interest rates or an increase in available inventory. This cautious approach has contributed to slower market activity, with fewer transactions compared to previous years. Sellers may need to adjust their expectations regarding pricing and the time it takes to sell a property.

In addition to legislative changes and economic pressures, the real estate industry is facing calls for commission reform. Traditionally, real estate agents earn commissions based on a percentage of the sale price, typically split between the buyer's and seller's agents. However, there is growing scrutiny of this model, with some advocating for fixed fees or sliding scale commissions based on service levels.

This push for reform is driven by concerns that the traditional commission structure may not reflect the value provided, especially in high-cost markets like California. As digital platforms reduce the need for traditional brokerage services, the industry could see significant changes in how agents are compensated.

The California real estate market in 2024 is in a state of transition. Legislative changes like AB 2559 and SB 567, coupled with national trends such as high mortgage rates and tight inventory, are reshaping the landscape. As these factors converge, the market presents both challenges and opportunities, requiring all stakeholders to stay informed and adaptable.
