CONTINUED TALES FROM THE VIETNAM JUNGLE

From the skies of Southeast Asia to the confines of prisoner-of-war (POW) cells, the Vietnam War was a battleground for courage, camaraderie, and survival. Retired USAF fighter pilot **Tony Marshall** shared his remarkable experiences from his time at UDorn Royal Thai Air Force Base, weaving together personal anecdotes, cultural insights, and tales of resilience.

For Tony Marshall, stationed at UDorn Royal Thai Air Force Base, camaraderie defined his experience. One of the most colorful characters

he encountered was "The Thief," a Pakistani man who could procure tailored suits for any occasion. Tony also fondly recalled dining at the local gem "Yom Noi," a restaurant that stood out for its delicious meals.

On the base, performance mattered more than skin color. Though everyone, regardless of rank, was referred to as "Boy" in casual parlance, Tony said there was no discrimination—it was all about how well you did your job.

The base had its quirks, including a nightly ritual called "The Dap," an ever-evolving handshake that became

a hallmark of their shared culture. Mascots added to the atmosphere: a Black Panther named Eldridge, a dog, and even an 8–10-foot python brought a strange sense of home to the base.

Nicknamed "Water Boy," Tony also indulged in his love of photography, capturing the unique mix of war and humanity around him.

Tony explained the high-stakes maneuvers required of fighter pilots, such as the "SAM break," a rapid change in altitude or direction to evade surface-to-air missiles.

Pilots were equipped with personal lowering devices containing 150 feet of webbing, allowing them to safely descend if their parachutes tangled in trees.

Friendship was critical to survival. Tony remembered Roger, nicknamed "The Wing Nerd," who ignored warnings during a mission. After his plane went down, Roger survived 14 days in the Vietnam wilderness before being rescued.

One of the most powerful stories Tony shared was about Mike Christian, a young Naval pilot imprisoned with him. Mike secretly crafted an American flag from scraps, sewing it together with threads from his blanket. When guards discovered the flag, Mike endured brutal torture. Yet, undeterred, he began making another flag, demonstrating unyielding courage. For Tony and others, the tattered flag symbolized freedom and unity, even in the darkest moments.

Tony also reflected on the cultural contrasts he observed in Vietnam:

The Vietnamese placed great importance on saving face.

Centuries of war had shaped their resilience.

Societal rules were strict—no mustaches, one romantic partner, and a single state-controlled newspaper.

Their philosophy emphasized redemption: "One good deed erases 100 bad deeds."

The 13th Tactical Fighter Squadron, known as the Panther Pack, lived by four simple but profound rules:

Get the mission done.

Bring everyone home.

If a MiG becomes a threat, take it out.

If it's not fun, you're not doing it right.

These principles balanced the seriousness of their mission with the need to find moments of levity amidst war.

Tony also recounted the story of John Milton, whose mother showed remarkable strength during his captivity. Even when informed of her son's capture, she remained stoic and resolved to support her family. Upon his return, she firmly demanded his release from the hospital, embodying resilience and unconditional love.

Through stories like those of **Tony Marshall, Mike Christian, and John Milto**n, we glimpse the courage and sacrifice of those who served during the Vietnam War. From the skies above Southeast Asia to the cells of POW camps, their experiences remind us of the power of resilience, unity, and patriotism.

Their legacy serves as a beacon of hope and a reminder of the strength of the human spirit.
